According to an announcement tion at the Brooklyn Public Li- from the Institute "the exhibition demonstrates radical changes in typography, color, illustration, printing processes and paper since 1915. The examples of covers and text pages selected for exhibition from 60-odd magazines show a progression from the traditional typography of the earlier period through an experimental decade following the war, to the 'new. typography' of the late 1920s.

"The new topography at first sought purely optical effects, but later stressed bold, logical and legible arrangement. The most notable change in the twenty-five years is the striking use of color in contemporary magazines."
