### Magazine Exhibition In Library Until July 26

An exhibit called "Twenty-Five Years of Magazine Design," sponsored by the American Institute of Graphic Arts, will be on display in the main lobby of the Library until July 26.

According to an announcement from the Institute "the exhibition demonstrates radical changes in typography, color, illustration, printing processes and paper since 1915. The examples of covers and text pages selected for exhibition from 60-odd magazines show a progression from the traditional typography of the earlier period, through an experimental decade following the war, to the 'new typography' of the late 1920s.

"The new typography at first sought purely optical effects, but later stressed bold, logical and legible arrangement. The most notable change in the twenty-five years is the striking use of color in contemporary magazines."
