All undergraduate women, upon matriculation, are automatically members of the organization and subject to its rules.

WSGA officers, elected each spring for the following year, include a president (senior), vicepresident (junior), secretary (senior), and treasurer (sophomore). The Senate which ultimately controls all business dealing with women students is presided over by the WSGA president while the vice-president presides over the House of Representatives.
