## Farm Products Prices Reach Alarming Stage

As a result of the increased spending power of consumers—one of the effects of the armament program—the price of farm products have increased to an alarming degree, according to Dr. G. E. Brandow, assistant professor of agricultural economics.

Dr. Brandow reports that the index of all commodity prices prepared by the Bureau of Labor Statistics rose 7 per cent from March to June, and in June was 16 per cent above its position in August, 1939, when the war started in Europe. Between March and June the index of Pennsylvania farm prices rose from 117 to 138.

## ROTC Initiates New Schedule

To relieve scheduling difficulties of two-hour classes, the ROTC department will initiate a new policy of five one-hour classes Monday to Friday, Col. Edward D. Ardery, head of the department, said yesterday.

"The change will not affect the amount of training available in a two-hour drill period. It will give the cadet officers an opportunity to develop their abilities to instruct and lead the companies," said Colonel Ardery.

Though the number of advanced ROTC students returning to College is uncertain, it is expected that 90 vacancies will be open to juniors. About 500 basic ROTC students have applied for the advanced course. The quota of juniors will rise if a number of seniors fail to return.

This year infantry parades will be held on Monday and engineers on Wednesday. New class rooms will also be used in a portion of the main floor of Carnegie Hall when it is completed about October 1.

## New Head Named For Ag Economics

Dr. Glenn W. Hedlund, recently a member of the Cornell University faculty, is the new head of the department of agricultural economics.

He replaces Dr. Fred F. Lininger who will devote full time to his duties as vice-dean of the School of Agriculture and vice-director of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

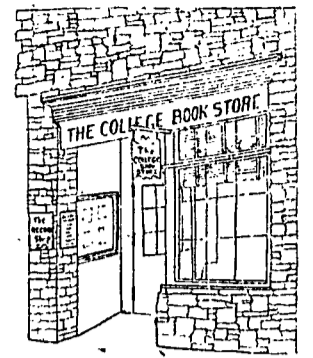
Dr. Hedlund was graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1930 and received his doctor of philosophy degree from Cornell in 1936. He had been a member of the Cornell faculty since 1930.

## History Of College Sent To Freshmen

A brief history of the College, entitled "Your Penn State," written by A. R. Warnock, dean of men since 1919, has been published and mailed to the incoming freshman class.

The history includes an account of the chartering of the Farmers High School in 1855, which was forerunner of the Agricultural College of Pennsylvania (1862), and the Pennsylvania State College (1874).

The growth and development of the College is traced from its first days enrollment of 69 students housed in a single building to its present student body of more than 7000 with a physical plant valued at well over 20 million dollars.

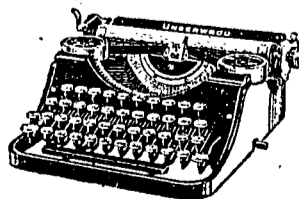

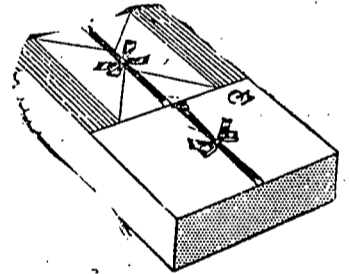
