Food Price Rise Causes Increase in Dorm Rates

The College Board of Trustees has increased board costs in women's dining halls \$9 a semester, beginning this fall, because of the national rise in food prices, according to President Ralph D. Hetzel.

He added that though the charge will be \$126 a semester or \$252 a year, it is low in comparison with prices of similar institutions. Charges in downtown dormitories have also been raised from \$7 to \$7.50 a week.

Decrease in Freshman Enrollment Expected

A slight decrease in freshman enrollment this year, in addition to the anticipated loss of about 500 men from the junior and senior classes, was predicted yesterday by Registrar William S. Hoffman.

He said that on September 7, the last date for which figures have been compiled, 1,559 freshmen had been admitted, as compared with 1,643 on the same date last year.
