

## Music Tryouts Held This Week

Vocal and instrumental tryouts for all campus musical organizations will be held starting today and continuing through next Monday.

All students interested in joining the Blue Band, symphony orchestra, ROTC bands, College Choir, or Glee Club should report at the scheduled time and place.

Instrumental tryouts will be divided as follows:

Trombones and baritone horns: Wednesday at 4 p. m.

Trumpets and cornets: Wednesday at 7 p. m.

Horns, mellophones and tubas: Wednesday at 9 p. m.

Flutes, piccolos and double reeds: Thursday at 4 p. m.

Clarinets: Thursday at 7 p. m.

Saxophones: Thursday at 9 p. m.

Percussion instruments: Friday at 4 p. m.

Drum majors: Monday, September 23, at 4 p. m.

Violas: Monday September 23, at 7 p. m.

Violas, cellos, string basses: Monday, September 23, at 8 p. m.

All instrumental tryouts will be held in 401 Old Main. For tryouts scheduled at 4 p. m., students may come at 5 if they have 4 o'clock classes.

Soprano and alto tryouts for the College Choir are scheduled for today between 4 and 5 p. m. and between 7 and 8 p. m. in Schwab Auditorium. They may also report on Wednesday at the same hours.

All male voices for both the College Choir and Glee Club should tryout Thursday between 4 and 6 p. m. and between 7 and 10 p. m. in the auditorium.

## Diesel Training Will Begin Today

Starting today, 30 Naval Reserve Officers will begin training in the College-sponsored Diesel engineering course, Harry P. Hammond, dean of the School of Engineering, announced yesterday.

This marks the third time that the course has been given since the U. S. Office of Education began intensive defense training almost a year ago. Penn State is one of only five colleges offering the course throughout the nation.

In the East, Lehigh, Cornell, and the University of North Carolina have a course similar to the one at Penn State, while the only college offering this training in the West is the University of California.

Upon completion of the course, a Reserve Officer is qualified to become an officer on Diesel-operated naval vessels.
