Free Association, Dutch Treats Included In Sorority Rushing

Free association with freshmen and transfer women for four weeks, including freshmen week has begun women's rushing season this year. During this time freshmen and transfers may visit sorority houses and suites. Outside associations will be on a "dutch treat" basis.

The Panhellenic Association will hold a tea Friday, October 3, to assist in freshman and transfer orientation.

Following the four-week period and before Thanksgiving, each sorority will have three open houses. Sorority women may not visit freshmen and transfers in their rooms or entertain them in sorority houses except at designated times of open houses, but outside associations may be continued.

Freshmen and transfers should attend as many open houses as possible for periods not exceeding 30 minutes at each house to become acquainted with women from all sororities.

Two get-togethers, attended by invitation only, will be held by each house between Thanksgiving and Christmas. These dates will be announced during November. Get-togethers will be followed by limited association until examination week, during which there will be a strict silent period.

Formal rushing will begin next semester with four informal parties and two formal ones preceding formal bidding. No woman may be bid unless she has been registered at the College for one semester and has a scholastic average of not less than one.

Transfer Name Cards Ready At Dean's Office

Transfer women who have not obtained name cards may get them from the dean of women's office or at the WSGA sponsored coffee hour in Atherton Hall at 6:30 tonight.

This custom, the only one required of transfers, will be carried out for two weeks. Coeds who have entered the College from undergraduate centers are considered transfers.

Freshmen requesting custom exemptions should report to Jeanne C. Stiles '42, WSGA Judicial Committee chairman, before tomorrow noon.

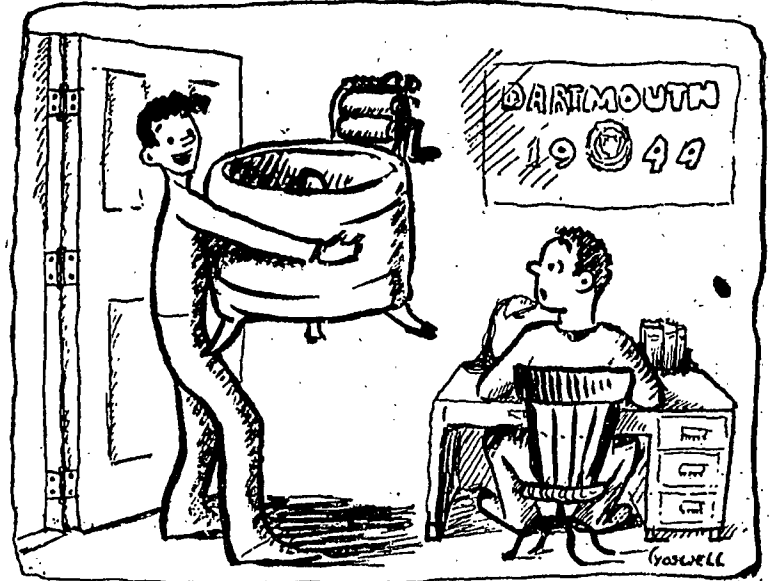
