

Chem-Physics, Mt Show Increase In Enrollment

With the national emergency probably the underlying factor, the Schools of Chemistry and Physics and Mineral Industries showed a marked increase when the total enrollment by schools of the campus students was released yesterday by Registrar William S. Hoffman.

The Registrar stated. "This count is unofficial and was made by hand assortment of the statistical cards." The Centers and Mt. Alto, however, have not yet reported.

The total campus enrollment grew to 5,930 yesterday as compared to a total of 6,131 students on September 20 last year which makes the outlook for the grand total registration larger than expected. Several have yet to register which should bring this year's figure close to last year's mark.

One unexplainable factor was brought out as a decline of 235 students in the School of Agriculture was strangely seen. Only 904 students enrolled this year as compared to 1,139 last year.

In the School of Chem-Physics, 724 registered this year to show an increase of 80 students. Only 306 enrolled in the School of Mineral Industries last year, while 407 entered this semester.

The 1,033 figure in 1940 as compared to 1,084 in 1941 told the story of the School of Engineering. Only 1,446 registered in Liberal Arts this term to show a drop of 44 enrollments from last year.

A drop in the number of students in the School of Education was seen as this year's 764 mark displayed a decline of 74 enrollees. A total of 155 students in the School of Physical Education was a drop of 23 from last year. Seventy-five are registered as two-year Agriculture students, while the Two-year Forestry course showed a total of 21.

Frosh Paraders Drenched Again

An orderly pajama parade from Jordan Hall to the women's dormitories was climaxed last night when the paraders, both freshmen and upperclassmen, were thoroughly drenched by buckets of water thrown from the Kappa Kappa Gamma house.

The original arrangements made by Charles F. Maclay '43, president of Jordan Hall, with the Kappas did not include that the upperclassmen be doused. But the Kappas had different ideas.

Not only were the innocent frosh given a sudden bath, but the upperclassmen—including Maclay—got their share of the aqua pura.

Originating in Jordan Hall about 9:45 o'clock, the 60-odd paraders took the traditional route to Mac Hall, Atherton Hall, Grange Dorm, the Women's Building and back to the dorms. Only at the Women's Building were the marchers' vocal renditions enthusiastically received.

Latest reports received when the Daily Collegian went to press were that Watts Hall, Jordan's erstwhile neighbor, was staging its own parade together with Irvin Hall. The archery targets on Holmes Field were also mysteriously set afire.

The rally will be sponsored by the College hat societies, with Charles F. Mattern '42, president of Skull and Bones, acting as general chairman.

"50 Best Books" In Library Show

The annual exhibit of "Fifty Books of the Year" will be shown at the College Library until October 4, sponsored by the American Institute of Graphic Arts, it was announced by Mrs. S. S. Carey, head of the exhibit.

The books were chosen from those manufactured and designed in the United States or Canada and published between December 1, 1939, and December 1, 1940. The jury for this 19th annual event included William A. Jackson (Harvard University Library), Mrs. Irita Van Doren (Editor, Herald-Tribune Books), and Walter Dorwin Teague, the industrial and magazine designer. It was asked to consider such qualities as format, legibility, color, and typography, in choosing the book.

The geographical distribution discloses that New York City is still the center of fine printing, for 31 of the 50 were produced there, with 7 in California, 5 in Massachusetts, 5 in Connecticut, 1 in Illinois, and 1 in New Mexico.
