

Brown Injures Leg In Pile-up At Scrimmage

The bad cousin of Lady Luck stalked the Nittany Lion football team yesterday as Sparky Brown, fleet tailback, injured his leg in practice scrimmage. An X-ray revealed that no bones were broken in his leg, but today another X-ray will be taken to determine the condition of his foot.

Brown sparkled in the practice session, especially on the defense. He was running hard and turning in long gains for his team when he was injured in a pile-up.

Practicing defense against Colgate passes, the Lion eleven showed improvement in their work. Chuck Raysor threatens to develop into a backer-up with a keen sense for diagnosing plays before they get under way. Several alert defensive plays were handled by the 165-pound center.

Bill Debler, although completing his second day in uniform, fought hard at the wingback post. With more experience the baseball captain may be a valuable reserve.

As a hint that the Nittany team will have to use all its craft against opponents, the Hig sent fullback Bill Smaltz through a kicking drill. Big Bill got off several A-1 kicks, some of them sailing 60 and 65 yards. Smaltz and Schoonover also teamed up to complete a 40-yard goal-line pass for the only score of the scrimmage.

Jack Banbury donned shoulder pads for the first time yesterday. His shoulder injury has healed sufficiently to take part in heavy practice. Wilbur Van Lenten, nursing an injured back, took part in the scrimmage for a few plays, but was not allowed to play long.

Brooklyn's beloved "Bums" clinched the National League pennant yesterday by defeating Boston, 6-0, while the St. Louis Cardinals' faint hopes were blasted by the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-1.

After being the Cardinals' favorite "cousins" all year, the fourth-place Pirates tasted sweet revenge yesterday by knocking the desperately-battling Gashousers out of the running behind Max Butcher's five-hit pitching. Southpaw Ernie White hurled for the losers.

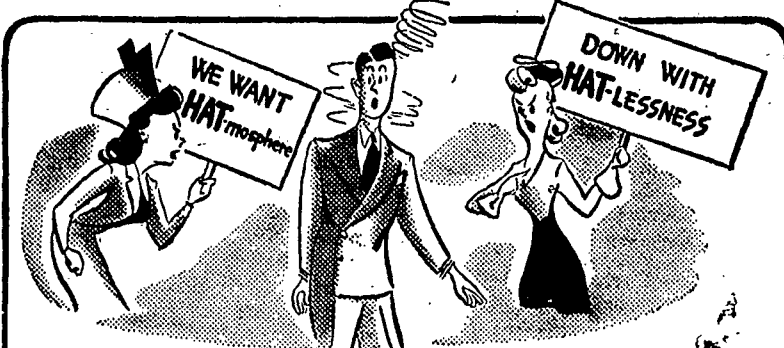
Temple, October 18—Haring, WIP, WWSW, WJAC, WLEU, WPIC, WKST, WCED, WMBS.

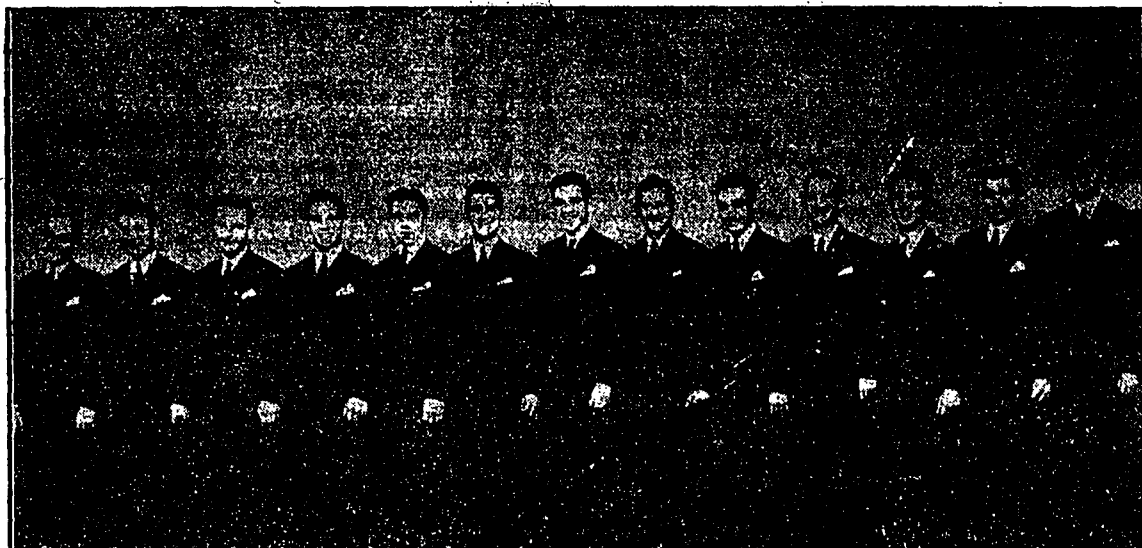
