

AA Board Adds \$375; Blue Key Society Freshmen Meet At 7: p. m. Blue Band 'Off To Buffalo' Taps 17 Juniors For First Class Assembly

Dercum Appointed Coach Of Ski Team

Latest news from the financial front indicates pretty definitely that the Blue Band will go to Buffalo for the Colgate football game Saturday, with the appropriation of \$375 by the Athletic Advisory Board at their meeting Saturday afternoon adding the remaining sum toward the \$1500 required for the trip.

Previously \$750, half of the total sum, had been furnished by the Buffalo Chamber of Commerce, and \$375 more was procured through the decision of the Interclass Finance Board last Wednesday to transfer that amount from its budget toward trip expenses.

In arriving at its decision the Athletic Advisory Board made it clear that this year's extra Blue Band trip is not to be regarded as a precedent, but merely as a concession to the popular student drive and as a cooperation with the generous offer of the Buffalo organization. The decision of the Board is subject to the approval of the All-College Cabinet at its meeting tonight.

Also decided upon at the meeting of the Athletic Board was the official appointment of Max Dercum as ski coach, Craig White '40, as assistant freshman football coach, and John Attel as junior varsity football coach.

It was announced that the State College Drum and Bugle Corps, national champions this year, will appear at the Lehigh-Penn State football game on October 25.

The Athletic Advisory Board will hold its next meeting on Alumni Homecoming weekend, Saturday, October 11.

Tucker Names Players Cast

With only two weeks remaining before their first performance of the season, the Penn State Players went into formal rehearsal of "The Male Animal" last night after the cast was chosen.

Two performances of the play, which saw a successful run on Broadway, will be given on campus. It will be staged on October 11, Alumni Homecoming Day, and on October 25, Dad's Day.

LONDON—Officials announced heaviest air attack on Italy occurred yesterday when RAF pilots raided from Northern Italy to Sicily.
