Shirley Colliss, 18-year-old sophomore transfer student, suddenly dropped dead at 12:45 p. m. yesterday while talking to friends in front of her dormitory at 427 W. Beaver ave.



An underdog Penn State team, E. Hamilton rated by sports writers as a soft touch for the greatly publicized E. Davis Colgate eleven, opens its 55th intercollegiate football season against T. Vohs the Red Raiders in Buffalo's Civic G. Endres Stadium at 2 p. m. today.

It will be the fifth meeting between the two elevens, the first Q.B Fox battle taking place in 1911. Penn L.H. Phinney State won one and lost three in the R.H. Geyer four previous games.
