Council Reverses Veto; Approves New Bus Stops

State College bus stops and a loading zone were approved at a special meeting last night, when by a five to one vote, Borough Council overrode Burgess Wilbur F. Leitzell's veto of this ordinance, previously passed by the Council September 15.

Two of the newly approved terminals are slated for the north and south sides of E. College ave. directly in back of Francis Atherton been granted one o'clocks by Hall. The southwest side of Coop corner has been sanctioned as location for both a bus stop and a loading zone. The fourth terminal site is located on the north side of College ave at Frazier st College ave., at Frazier st.

Councilman H. L. Stuart moved for reconsideration and adoption of the vetoed bus stop ordinance which was then passed five to one with Councilman O. W. Houts polling the only dissenting vote. Council President Russel E. Clark was not present at the meeting, at which Councilman Leonard A. Doggett presided.
