Norm Gordon, Herm Goffberg, Mike Peters, Pop Thiel, and Vern Koz, along with Bourgerie make up the sextet of seniors. Other scheduled starters are Curt Stone, Bob Faloon, Mac Smith, and Andy Hyson.

Steve Waters, Manhattan's derby-bearing mentor, is bringing a squad of nine. Big gun of the crew is Captain Vin Tiernan, the only senior running for the New York College.

Formidable among the Manhattan color-bearers are the four sophomores, Brady, Casey, Walsh, and O'Toole, winners of last year's freshman IC4-A's.

In the six previous meetings of the two colleges, Manhattan has come out of five of the contests victorious while Penn State won only once.

Booters Open Season Against Colgate Today

Nittany Lions Seek
62 Straight Win

Seeking to continue their astounding winning streak, which has reached 61 consecutive games without defeat in the past eight seasons, the Nittany Lion soccer men will begin their quest for a ninth unblemished season against Colgate at Hamilton, N. Y. today.

Since Penn State has never met the Red Raider's soccer squad before, the calibre of the opposition is pretty much of a question mark. However, some indication of the strength of Coach Joe Dalgety's booters may be had from their performance against Cornell last Saturday.

Although losing, 2-1, to the strong Ithacans, Colgate turned in some spectacular field work and put up a cagey defense. And in "Big Bill" Filson they have a scoring threat to be reckoned with.

But Lion Coach Bill Jeffrey, accustomed to seeing his superb teams outclass the cream of the nation's elevens each year, predicted victory for the Nittanymen in today's tilt. "This year's squad is as good as last year's champions," the usually cautious Scot said, "and Colgate will have to be surprisingly strong to beat us."

Veterans who will strive to uphold the Jeffrey men's undefeated tradition today include Captain Woody King of All-East fame at center forward; Gringo Galindo of Panama at outside left, Ned Corman at inside left, Allan Heck and Hap Freeman at the fullback posts, and Don Mcgrail at center halfback.

To Charley Arnold, a reserve last year, will be entrusted the man-sized job of filling the shoes of last year's Captain Walt Hosterman at right halfback. Rounding out the starting lineup will be four sophomores from last year's undefeated freshman team—Johnny Struck at goal, Sammy Schnure at left halfback, Bill Prichard at inside right, and Smiley Williams at outside right.

Last minute changes may find Ramzi Gurcay, a sophomore from Turkey, in Williams' place, and Boyd Ethers, also a sophomore, in Schnure's position. Reserve linemen Lloyd Black and Charles Lischer and backfield replacement Johnny Dufford also made the trip to Hamilton yesterday.

We've seen Bob Higgins' squad work out daily since pre-season practice started and we saw our traditional rival open its season two weeks ago. In spite of their defeat against Colgate last Saturday, State's eleven proved it can meet the best of them on equal terms.

'45 Eleven Faces Bucknell Gridders

With several former star high school players in their line-up, the yearling Nittany Lions will stage a preview of next year's varsity battle with Bucknell when they face the Bison cubs on New Beaver Field at 10 a. m.

This year's crop of huskies look especially promising to Coach Marty McAndrews. As a team, he thinks they measure up well to past highly-promising elevens. His first team will average close to six feet in height and weigh nearly 190 pounds on the average.

McAndrews prides in his star-studded backfield. At left halfback he plans to start a brilliant star, Dave Alston. Alston can thread the eye of a needle with his passing accuracy. He is fast and shifty. Although he is primarily a passer, he receives passes as if he had glue on his hands.

Harry Alston, a brother, is also versatile in the backfield. An Alston-to-Alston passing combination now works with no uncertain accuracy, with Harry on the receiving end. The right halfback makes a specialty in hard running and vicious tackling on the defense.

A quarterback of no little repute is Ray Ulinski. Bob Weitzel, former all-state selection, is a hard-smashing fullback who passes with surprising accuracy. With he and Dave Alston in the backfield, the offense can expect a double-barreled passing attack.

On the line Joe Cacovic will start at center. Formerly, he was named on the all-state team. At the guard posts Steve Suhey and Leo Noble, two fast gridders, flank the center.
