

New Coed Drinking Measure Tabled; Senate Passes Revised Constitution

Will Study Proposal With Other Groups

WSGA Senate tabled for further investigation a letter from Dean Charlotte E. Ray, recommending action on coed drinking in vicinity roadhouses.

Senate unanimously accepted the streamlined WSGA Constitution submitted to Senators last week. The revised constitution provides for sectioning various governing branches of the organization and sets forth specific qualifications and duties of WSGA officers.

The suggestion prohibiting coed drinking was put aside for later action until other campus agencies and organizations had been consulted.

Jean Babcock '42, WSGA president, stated that the recommendation will be presented in All-College Cabinet meeting this week, and proposals will be made to have committees from WSGA, JFC, and hat societies study the measure.

Senators were urged to take the problem to hall and house meetings for additional comments and consideration.

Two amendments were added to the up-to-date constitution. WSGA secretary will serve as chairman of the WSGA nominating group composed of senior senators. Another provision was accepted making freshman senators ex-officio members of Freshman Council.

The motion made by Margaret K. Sherman '43, WSGA vice-president, that the American Red Cross and Friends Service drives among coeds be incorporated with WSGA's annual Christmas fund campaign, was passed.

It was decided that freshman women engaged in project work in architectural laboratories over weekends need not forfeit one o'clock permissions for the work.

Senate approved the naming of six women to WSGA Dance committees. Members include Janet M. Hartz '42, chairman, M. Elizabeth Shelly '42, and E. Elizabeth Eshleman '43; invitations, Marjory D. Cousley '42, chairman, Claire H. Hildinger '42 and Elizabeth E. Munroe '43. E. Louise Hack '42 was previously named general chairman.

Eleanor Lathrop '45 has been named secretary of WSGA Freshman Council.

It is recommended that the statement on page 38, Section III, of the 1941 Handbook be revised to include a rule against drinking in surrounding communities or roadhouses. (Attention is called to Regulation of Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board, page 17, with reference to the selling or giving of liquor to minors.)

The need of complete loyalty to our College and its reputation, as well as our responsibility to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, was most ably presented by President Hetzel in his talk to freshmen on October 14. No better reason could be given for reminding every student that wherever she goes she represents the Pennsylvania State College.
