An interesting study of a new variation of what was formerly a traditionized houseparty weekend will be climaxed in a few days . . . that of the combining of Soph Hop and houseparty weekend dates.

For many years, houseparty dances consisted of formal and informal dances on Friday and Saturday night of that weekend. Some fratermities exchanged dances on these evenings. However, the inserting of Soph Hop into the house-- party weakend, scheduled for next Friday and Saturday, has raised an unusual situation.

Fraternities began to bicker among themselves. Some maintained that the addition of Soph Hop would tax the budgets of individual members and discourage the appearance of alumni at the dances. Others refuted this by stating that the Houseparty-Soph Hop due would attract as many alumni members, and that the combination of two weekends would save money for individual members. In addition, they said, a more balanced weekend with a big name orchestra would please both import and coed dates.

Two factions arose: About half of the fraternities rebelled and voted to hold house dances - both nights and boycotted the Soph Hop. This faction believed that a fraternity houseparty consists of a strictly fraternity affair and that the invasion of a class function will decrease the prestige of houseparty weekends.

The other group proposed that the rising increase in fraternity buying and the necessity for decreases in fraternity budgets are favorable indications that Soph Hop could save fraternities some money. It was pointed out that the dropping of one week from the College schedule compelled the Student Union Board to combine the " two dates.

Whatever group is correct, the answer will be ... given this weekend. The answer will not necessarily be the right one, but it will be, for the time being, an indication of the fraternity attitude.

However, if fraternity support of the Soph Hop is dropped, if fraternity members cannot reconcile their attitudes toward a new addition to their houseparty setup, the future Soph Hop committees will be forced to look for another spot where they can eliminate the "Soph Flop" tradition.

From The Daily Collegian viewpoint, we hope the frateguities accept what we feel is another Jeature attraction of a weekend which is definite-· ly a fraternity affair, but which can be heightened and varied with the addition of a few non-fratermity highlights.




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
