Dean Warnock Names 7 Central Committees

"all-out" defense program for the purpose of organizing the College Division of the State College Council of Defense was initiated at the first meeting of 20 student, faculty, and administrative leaders yesterday.

A. R. Warnock, dean of men and chairman of the campus defense project, appointed committee chairmen and outlined plans for speeding up campus organization.

"The purpose of the College council is to supplement the armed defense of the nation by enlisting students and faculty in a diversifled-list of activities which are intended to promote the broad program of national defense and also to protect the safety and welfare of the campus," Dean Warnock revealed.

"If we defend democracy in a democratic way by voluntarily offering our services, as compared to the dictatorial defense methods of the totalitarian powers, the danger of a surprise invasion and mized," the dean warned.

Designed to set up a complex ment of seven central committees. These groups will have various sub-committees consisting of student and faculty members.

The central committees and their chairmen are: Committee on Protection, George W. Ebert, superintendent of grounds and buildings; Committee on First Aid Instruction, Physical Fitness, and Recreation, Dean Carl P. Schott, School of Physical Education and Athletics; Committee on American Unity, Julius E. Kaulfass, professor of highway engineering; Committee on Contacts with Faculty, Students, and Alumni in the Armed Forces of the United States,
