The program committee of Pi Lambda Theta, national women's education honorary, yesterday released the year's schedule of events which includes panel discussions, quiz programs, and a vocational display.

Committee members are R. Helen Gordon '42, president; Virginia E. Spalding, graduate student; and Marge King '42, who will serve as president for the next eight weeks.

A quiz kids program with State College youngsters participating will be held in northwest Atherton, November 19. March 3, the honorary will present a hobby and vocational display at an open house with Dr. Buelah Van Wageningen, national vice-president, as guest in southwest Atherton.

"Professional Problems of Women," Pi Lambda Theta's program study for the year, will be the subject of a student-faculty panel discussion December 3. A creative arts panel with three professors will be open to the public in southwest Atherton February 11. Another discussion on the role of professional women in time of a national emergency will be directed by faculty members in southwest Atherton February 26.

With Phi Delta Kappa, national men's industrial education honorary, Pi Lambda Theta will work on an educational project for April 15. Business meetings will be held January 7 and March 18, with follow-up discussions on professional problems and talks on pleading.
