Under the auspices of PSCA, Miss Drivas and Miss Irwin direct the women in walking, running, games, and exercises in Laurelton's new gymnasium. They aim to give them an understanding of basic good posture.

Eight hundred and sixty inmates live in cottages, housing about 70 each. Two PSCA community service committee members conduct weekly programs in each cottage, including reading, singing, and dancing.

These prices will provide stage seats for the performances of Marian Anderson and Lauritz Melchior, a seat in the foyer for the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, and standing room for Ruth Draper. A maximum of four tickets will be sold to one person.

Otherwise, Dr. Marquardt stated, last year's conditions of sale will prevail. The house will be divided into alternate rows for students and faculty-townspeople. Charts indicating the division of the house into various price brackets will be on display at Student Union, and signed proxy forms will again be necessary where students are commissioned to buy seats for faculty members or townspeople, according to Marquardt.
