



Three Students Named Judges For Talent Night

Three students have been named to assist the faculty judging committee for the All-College Talent Night on December 3, Arthur Peskoe '42, Penn State Club president, announced last night.

Singers of popular and classical numbers, instrumentalists, impersonators, and dramatic performers may vie for three \$10 prizes before a committee including Betty L. Ziegler '42, cabinet representative, J. Louis Nageotte '42, Penn State Club representative, and Herbert J. Zukauskas '43, Daily Collegian representative.

Gerald F. Doherty '42, All-College vice-president, will act as master of ceremonies for the campus competition which will serve as a preliminary for the \$200 Fred Allen contest.

In addition to receiving \$200 for a national broadcast one of the three local winners will have all expenses paid to New York for the January 7th Fred Allen Show.

Regulations on undergraduates entering the combined contests include stipulations that entrants may not form teams and must provide their own accompaniment. Applicants must sign up at Student Union by Wednesday, November 26.

Faculty judges include Richard W. Grant, head of the music department; J. Ewing Kennedy, director of Theatricals; H. Ridge Riley, department of public information; W. E. Kenworthy, assistant to the president, and Miss Ruth Zang, assistant dean of women.

Defense Committee Will Instruct First-Aid Workers

Bleed and broken bones which require the expert attention of trained first-aid workers present a vital problem in the welfare of students and faculty members during war times.

It is the purpose of the sub-committee on first-aid to prepare for just such exigencies in the campus civilian defense program.

Instructor's training consists of a 30-hour course open to adults who have completed the standard course in first aid. Classes five nights a week from 7 to 10 p. m. begin December 1.

Anyone who has completed the standard course and is interested in taking the advanced training should contact John W. Hulme, instructor in physical education.

A basic course of 20-hours for students will be taught after the instructor's classes have ended.

"Our biggest problem now is to find instructors for the student training. The advanced course will furnish some of these, but the number scheduled for the course is hardly adequate. Cooperation of anyone who has taken the standard course and not been contacted by the committee for enrollment in the course will be appreciated," Hulme pointed out last night.

Naval Enlistments High

Penn State, with a total of 55 enlistments, leads all other universities in the number of men in the Fourth Naval District of the Naval Air Corps, according to Thomas W. Allison '42, seaman, second class, V5. Most of the group is of either the class of 1941 or 1942.

Low Price Tickets Available At Pitt

Low price tickets admitting Nittany rooters to a special Penn State section at Pitt Stadium will go on sale at the University of Pittsburgh Athletic Office Saturday morning, according to Charles F. Mattern '42, president of that society council.

These tickets are priced at \$1.38 and will admit the bearer to Section 28. Over 500 tickets will be available until 1 p. m. Saturday at the Pitt AA office, which is the brick building located opposite Gate 14 of the stadium. After 1 p. m. ducats may be purchased at Gate 18 for the same price.

Mattern explained that this plan will enable Penn State fans to form a more concentrated cheering section than the one at last year's Pitt game.

Morse Reviews Shrine History

Adrian O. Morse, assistant to the president and chairman of the Lion Shrine Committee, in answer to student questions on the Lion Shrine site has released the following statement:

"In reply to questions about the completion of the Nittany Lion to be carved in stone, and about the choice of a site, I can give the following summary of the facts as I know them.

"The class of 1940 presented the College with approximately \$5,000 for a lion shrine." The Board of Trustees accepted the gift at its meeting on June 8, 1940.

"In February, 1941, the president of the class of 1940 appointed Messrs. R. E. Clark, G. L. Donovan, F. E. Hyslop, and A. O. Morse a committee to represent the class in choosing the site and the sculptor.

"In March, 1941, the committee invited Heinz Warneke to come to State College, showed him the locations which had been suggested, and discussed with him the various possibilities.

In an attempt to give Nittany fans an idea of what to expect from the Pitt grid machine, Gerald F. Doherty '42, master of ceremonies, asked Coaches F. Joe Bedenk and Earle Edwards to comment on what they had seen while scouting the Panthers this season.

Bedenk claimed that Pitt is the toughest team on the Nittany schedule this year. But our team is at its best too, Bedenk added, and the sophomore line is determined to do something that our experienced senior line could not do last year.

Commenting on the Panther star—Edgar "Special Delivery" Jones, Coach Edwards said, "Jones did very little against us here two years ago when we won, 10-0, but last year at Pitt Stadium he was a thorn in our side.
