

Mack To Talk On Nutrition

Townpeople, faculty members, and students are invited to hear Dr. Pauline B. Mack, professor of textile chemistry and director of the Ellen H. Richards Institute, speak on nutrition and to see two moving pictures at an open meeting in 110 Home Economics Building at 7 o'clock tonight.

As part of the national defense program, Dr. Mack is investigating the nutritional status of families of various incomes.

Dr. Joseph J. Lowden, associate professor of education, has collaborated with Dr. Mack in taking moving pictures of school children and families who have participated in the nutrition program. This film, "Research on Human Nutrition," will be shown.

"New Foods Make News," a technicolor sound film on production and use of frozen foods, will also be shown.

Artists' Course Lowers Price

The remaining tickets will be on sale at the Athletic Association ticket windows in Old Main on Thursday, January 22. One hundred thirty stage seats originally priced at \$5.50 will be offered at \$4.40 each, tax paid. Thirty-eight Auditorium seats, formerly costing \$6.05, will now sell for \$4.95 each, including tax.

"The committee approved the reduction in the interest of students who found it difficult or impossible to buy series tickets when the majority of them cost over five dollars," Marquardt stated.
