No dates may be made nor may sorority women be seen with rushees in downtown eating places. Greeks will not be permitted to make dates for the basketball game on Wednesday, February 11 before 6 p. m. Monday, February 9.

A strict silent period will be observed on Sunday, February 11 and from 9 p. m. Thursday, February 12 until 5 p. m. Saturday, February 14.
