

AAUW Offers Shows, Food

Side-shows, dancing, and food concessions sponsored by local organizations will attract students, faculty, and townspeople to AAUW's festival for defense in the State College high school gymnasium from 8 p. m. until midnight tonight.

Held in conjunction with Victory Ball, tickets for the two affairs will be interchangeable.

Campus bands playing for the AAUW benefit are the Owls, who will play from 8 to 9:30 p. m. and the Aristocrats who will entertain from 10:30 p. m. until midnight. Also included in tonight's program are Thespian's mobile unit floor show and side shows, including the Bearded Lady, fire-eater, and Siamese twins.

Proceeds will go to the Red Cross and AAUW fellowship and student loan fund. Food concessions sponsored by local organizations will be homemade cake and candy, Women's Club, hamburgers and "hot dogs," Alpha Fire Company, and soft drinks, Junior Red Cross.

Visiting Naval officers, who are study Diesel engineering at the College will be guests at the festival.

Dance Clubs Aid Fitness

As a means of relaxation and physical fitness during the future long-term College sessions, two new freshman dance clubs have been added to the modern dance program at White Hall, according to Miss Jessie Cameron, assistant professor of physical education.

The four dance clubs will meet for an hour at 2 p. m. every Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday and at 8:30 p. m. Wednesday. Previous dance experience is advisable for eligibility, but not necessary. Organization of a club for dramatics majors will take place this semester.

Membership for the Concert Group, which meets two hours at 6:30 p. m. Monday, requires at least two years of dance instruction and dance club membership. The Concert Group, as well as dance classes and clubs, has been organized for four years.

For the past two years it has presented two productions a year, and has worked in several Players' shows. Its production last spring was entitled "Patterns of Our Days," while last year's Christmas production was "The Nativity." In December it presented "A Christmas Service in France."

The next production will be given before the end of the semester and will have a South American theme in a program of good will.

Women from modern dance classes also participate in May Day exercises each year.
