## Women Students To Elect Queen For Senior Ball

### Economy Forbids Class Attendants

To replace the May Queen, coeds will elect a "Senior Queen" who will be announced at Senior Ball in Recreation Hall on Friday, February 27, it was decided by WSGA Senate last night. H. Leonard Krouse, senior class president, will be asked to crown her. WSGA senators decided the queen will be unattended, in keeping with their decision to limit expenditures during the new Mother's Day weekend, April 17 and 18.

Senior members of WSGA Senate will meet Saturday to choose candidates. Additional nominations will be made at a mass meeting tentatively scheduled for Schwab Auditorium on Tuesday, February 17. Preliminary elections will probably be Thursday, February 19, and choice of one of three finalists on Tuesday, February 24, in Old Main lobby.

Anne M. Borton, senior senator, reported that the music department has agreed to help plan entertainment for Mother's Day weekend. Miss Borton, working with Patricia MacKinney '43 and A. Jane Minnich '44, co-chairmen, will name coed committees this week.

Importance of filing petitions to indicate interest in WSGA was stressed by Jean Babcock '42, WSGA president. Petitions including information about All-College averages, other activities, and experiences may be given to hall or dormitory presidents, WSGA Senate members, or the dean of women's office by Friday, February 20.

In an attempt to secure more representative voting, two plans for naming six senior honor women were discussed. Miss Babcock suggested that WSGA send postcards to senior coeds containing three nominations for each office, made by a representative committee. Jeanne C. Stiles '42, WSGA Judicial Committee chairman, said that election of honor women might be conducted during regular WSGA elections. Action will probably be taken next week.

Junior and senior women will hold their annual reception for faculty members in Old Main lounges from 7:30 to 10 p. m. on Wednesday, April 8, it was decided after a report from Miss Borton and a motion by I. Jacqueline Shaffer, junior senator.
