

Greeks Face Final 'Rush'

With crossed fingers sororities swing into the last two days of intensive rushing. Hoping to influence undecided rushees 14 houses will hold 15 informal parties tonight and tomorrow.

Rushees are again urged by Pan-Hellenic Council President, Jean A. Krauser '42, to turn averages and names into the dean of women's office after receiving grade sheets from the Bursar's office today.

Second silent period, cutting all contact between Greeks and rushees, will begin at 9 p. m. tomorrow until 5 p. m. Saturday.

Formal dinner invitations will be delivered by individual house members after 9 p. m. tomorrow. Written answers must be handed into Student Union between 1 and 5 p. m. Friday. Replies will be available to rushing chairmen at 5 p. m. Friday.

Rushees may accept two dinner invitations scheduled for 5:30 to 7 p. m. and 7:30 to 9 p. m. Saturday. Rushees should specify time of dinner acceptance.

Your WSGA— Behind The Lines

(Editor's note: This is fifth in a series of articles discussing the purpose and organization of women's student government.)

As its name implies, WSGA Junior Service Board was established primarily to act as a service organization in connection with other WSGA groups.

Its members conduct tabulation of activities points, serve as transfer sponsors, and carry out miscellaneous WSGA Senate projects. The Board may initiate and act on its own projects, with Senate's approval.

Senate appoints members before May 15 of their sophomore year. To be eligible, a coed must have shown leadership ability, not have too many outside activities, and not be a member of Cwens, sophomore women's honorary. Board members have power to fill vacancies, but appointments are subject to Senate approval.

A chairman and secretary are elected by the group by a majority vote. The chairman presides at meetings, appoints and serves as an ex-officio member of committees.

According to the WSGA constitution, the purpose of WSGA Judicial Committee is "to hear the defense of women students reported for breaking regulations and to penalize them if found guilty."

Membership is made up of two representatives from each class, who serve for four years. Sub-chairman of WSGA Freshman Council automatically becomes a member; the second is appointed by Senate.

Always a senior, the chairman of Judicial is appointed by Senate at the end of her junior year, upon recommendation of the out-going chairman.

She presides at meetings, conducts hearings, oversees business, and serves as an ex-officio member on Senate. The secretary, a junior, is elected by the committee.

Beginning Monday PSCA will sponsor evening fireside sessions among 10 women's groups with faculty members discussing current topics.

Alpha Omicron Pi will hear J. Paul Selsam, associate professor of European history, speak on "The Causes of the Present Conflict" Monday. Miss Charlotte E. Ray, dean of women, will discuss "Democracy as a Personality Trait" at Kappa Kappa Gamma. "Propaganda and War" will be the topic of William J. Gaskill, instructor of English composition, at Monday's meeting of Women's Building freshmen.

Jabir Shibli, associate professor of mathematics, will use "Philosophies of Life" for Anchorage freshmen Tuesday. McAllister Hall, third north, will hear Miss Mary Jane Stevenson, assistant to the dean of women, discuss "Human Relations."

"Wildlife Conservation," an illustrated talk by Ralph L. Watts, dean emeritus of agriculture, also will be given at Wiley Dormitory, Tuesday.

McAllister Hall, third south, will hear Harold W. Weigel, assistant professor of German, speak on "Hitler's Germany," Wednesday, while Ernest W. Callenback, professor of poultry husbandry, will speak on "You, I, or We?" at the Nittany Co-op.

Duane V. Ramsey, assistant professor of sociology, will discuss "Social Problems" at Allen Street Co-op Wednesday. Howard E. Yarnell, instructor of German, will speak on "My Experiences as a Student in Germany" in northeast Atherton Hall.
