Coeds May Name More Candidates

Five second semester seniors, chosen by senior WSGA Senate members as Senior Queen candidates, were announced last night and will be introduced at a women's mass meeting in Schwab Auditorium at 7 p. m. tomorrow.

Additional nominations may be made from the floor. According to Jean Babcock '42, WSGA president, who will preside, new candidates must be present at the meeting, to be introduced by the coed who nominates them.

Candidates will be required to give pictures, at least 3 by 5 inches, to Patricia MacKinney '43, by Wednesday. They will be displayed on a bulletin board in Old Main lobby Thursday, day of preliminary elections.

Miss MacKinney and A. Jane Minnich '44, Mother's Day weekend co-chairmen, will supervise this election and the final one Tuesday, February 24.

The senior chosen by coeds from the three finalists will be crowned by H. Leonard Krouse, senior class president, at Senior Ball February 27.
