For air-minded coeds the United Airlines have published tips on becoming airline stewardesses.

Coeds are urged to study difficult subjects such as speech, English, hygiene, sociology and home economics by Donald F. Magarrell, director of passenger service. Two years college training will be a requisite for potential stewardesses. Physical requirements have not been altered during the emergency, according to Mr. Magarrell.

All applicants must average between five feet two and five feet five inches, not over 120 pounds in weight, and between 21 and 25 years of age.

Previously required nursing certificates have been dispensed with during war-time need for nurses.

Women who want to get in the air are reminded of the school for stewardesses which will open soon in Chicago.

Enthusiasm Plus Grooming Equals Job, Says Jordan

"Enthusiasm is what counts in business interviews," said Miss Ruby Mae Jordan of the Katherine Gibbs Secretarial School, who spoke on problems of women in business yesterday.

Miss Jordan's talk for all interested students was sponsored by Tau Phi Sigma, secretarial honorary, and Mortar Board, senior women's honorary.

Direct application followed by an interview is the most effective method of obtaining a job, is the opinion of Miss Jordan. Other ways are through college placement bureaus or a good commercial agency, government fields, ads in daily papers, and through influence of friends and relatives.

Before applying for an interview, Miss Jordan advised future applicants to decide on a particular field and to analyze training and interest in special lines. They should then look up all companies specializing in that work in a telephone directory and write applications only to those in cities within commuting distance.

"Personal appearance is very important in the interview, as well as enthusiasm." And Miss Jordan suggested a good night's sleep in preparation. She further stated that make-up, hair style and clothes should be simple but immaculate. Every business woman's wardrobe should include at least three tailored dresses.

Best hours for interviews are from 10:30 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. She stressed that applicants should be prepared to undergo any physical or psychological tests or to fill out any records.

Debating against six teams, women's debate team tied for second place in the Shippensburg State Teachers' College contest at Shippensburg Saturday. Teams from 25 colleges participated.

Florence I. Jaffy '44, constructive, and C. Betty Freidman '44, cross-examination, for the affirmative; and R. Helen Gordon '42, constructive, and Sara M. Bailey '43, cross-examination, negative, debated the question—Resolved: That the federal government should regulate all unions within the United States.

The affirmative team defeated men's teams from American University and Kutztown, and Bridgewater women. Losing to Bridgewater and Houghton men, the negative team won from Dickinson men.

College coaches were judges. Clayton H. Schug, associate professor of public speaking, and coach of women's debate team, and Paul R. Beall, instructor of public speaking and assistant coach, accompanied the team. Mr. Beall was judge.

Friday night the same team entered an inter-squad debate at Mont Alto Forestry School. Women debated with one another. Paul H. Morrill, Mont Alto instructor of English composition, chaired the debate. An open forum discussion followed.

L. Jeanne Kaiser '43 and Margaret K. Ramaley '44 will debate affirmatively against William Smith College women at Bellewood, Pa., at 8 p. m. Wednesday. The question used in weekend competitions will be debated.
