

## IWA To Vote On New Setup

Independent women will meet to discuss and vote on ratification of the proposed IWA constitution in the Home Economics auditorium at 7 p. m. Monday, according to Hazel E. Gassman '43, IWA proponent. Sylvia P. Schmidle '42 will present a brief history of the movement.

Provided the constitution is approved by two-thirds of the non-Greeks present, it will be presented, with a petition signed by unaffiliated coeds, to the Senate Committee on Student Welfare for approval within a week.

Speaking on behalf of IWA leaders, Miss Gassman requested independents who are opposed to organization as well as those in favor of it to attend the meeting and voice opinions. Sorority women may go but may not vote.

Action to organize was started in September under leadership of Miss Schmidle, Miss Gassman, and Joanne M. Palmer '43. Sufficient interest was evident at an open meeting in December to encourage proponents to draw up a tentative constitution in January.

Date for a future meeting, at which officers will probably be chosen, will be set at Monday's meeting.

Sigma Phi Epsilon will entertain Alpha Chi Omega pledges at a dance from 8 p. m. to midnight.

## We, The Women Why Bend Over Backwards Being Bored? It's No Trouble For You To Have Fun

At the eastern end of the campus stand two comparatively new, red brick structures. One of them contains a spacious swimming pool, a bowling alley, a room with ping pong tables, a large gymnasium with basketball, volleyball, and badminton facilities, a body mechanics room, a rhythm room where coeds may learn modern dance, a fencing room, a lounge, and other sports rooms.

The other building, a few steps away, houses 500 coeds of which more than 200 spend Friday nights sitting beside telephones. We're speaking of White Hall and Atherton Hall.

Perhaps Penn State should have a dating bureau. Or perhaps these 200 women should take advantage of the recreation facilities offered at White Hall.

Two weeks ago, physical education majors inaugurated a plan whereby coeds could spend Friday nights and Saturday afternoons, not only enjoying these facilities, but gaining instruction in sports activities as well. The turnout was between 85 and 100 women, but there are still more than a 100 who haven't shown interest.

This may be accounted for in several ways. First of all, coeds may feel that White Hall belongs only to physical education majors. The new plan blasts such a theory.

Secondly, many women complain that when they visit White Hall to swim or bowl, they are

told that a life saving class or a tournament is scheduled for that hour. To remedy this, coeds have been given schedules of hours for swimming, bowling, badminton, and other activities.

In addition, women may call White Hall at any time for information concerning the new set-up and for additional instruction during the week. Those not interested in sports may play bridge or learn social dancing.

White Hall was built for all Penn State coeds, and the new program was begun in an attempt to stress this fact. Women who have not taken advantage of it should do so immediately.

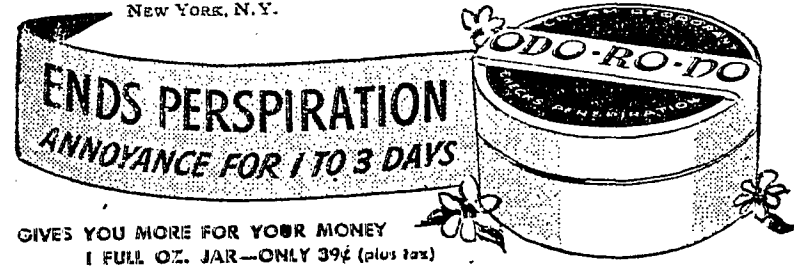
