The varsity gymnasts continued to share the EIGA league lead with Army by sinking a strong Navy team 30-24 at Annapolis Saturday afternoon.

With the Middies leading 23-22 going into the tumbling event, Hal Zimmerman and Ed Anderson copped first and second positions to give the Lions their winning margin.

Sol Small led the Wettstonemen in scoring with a first on the parallel bars and third places in the side horse and rings for a total of seven points. Although injured while warming up for the flying rings, Small competed and displayed a smooth routine to gain one point for the Lions.

Charles Warrington pulled the greatest upsets when he placed second on the side horse and Sid Rudman won second place on the rings, being edged out of first place by one point.

Middle Captain Midshipman Blattman, won the side horse, horizontal bar, and placed second on the parallel bars to pace his team with 13 points.

Captain Charlie Senft tied Midshipman Cox in the rope climb at 4.2 but lost in the climb-off by one-tenth of a second. Senft, however, broke the Penn State record of 4.3 set by Roman Pieo last year.

## Baird Wins As Army Scores, 6½-1½ Victory

The Nittany boxers will look for greener pastures tonight when they invade Syracuse after receiving their second straight setback at the hands of the Army Cadets Saturday night, 6½-1½.

A rejuvenated line-up will face the veteran Orange team tonight. Coach Leo Houck inserted Milt Dickson, Ed Gales, and Max Palena in the roster for the Army tilt and will continue his juggling by taking Jess Fardella instead of Dickson and Bill Calvert in place of Gales for the Syracuse battle.

The Lions meet a formidable Orange team tonight, with the Bob Baird-Lorn Schoff 145-pound battle promising to be outstanding. Schoff is a two-time EIBA winner and Baird is undefeated this season.

Captain Bob Baird was the only Lion puncher to taste victory at West Point while Jack Grey made a last round come-back to gain a draw for the other one-half point. Dickson, Gales, and Palena lost their bouts by close decisions and Aldo Cerri lost a heart-breaking match to his more aggressive opponent, Cadet Burdett.

Homei Hoffman and Cadet Peden tangled in the feature bout in which Peden registered his fifth straight, first round TKO of the season. Both contestants fought viciously but Peden dropped Hoffman with a right hook in 1:14 of the initial period.

Bill Richards had difficulty in reaching his taller 155-pound opponent, Cadet Lane, and lost by a decision.

## Mountaineers Rated Among Nation's Best

Rated fourth in the nation's basketball standings, West Virginia's high-scoring courtmen will continue their conquest for the Eastern championship when they battle Coach John Lawther's Lions on the Rec Hall hardwood tomorrow night at 8 o'clock.

Even though the heralded Mountaineers are favored to win, this long-awaited court classic should be a battle of champions all the way. Coach John Lawther's Lions have won nine straight and are expected to rebound following their mediocre 33-28 victory over the Pitt Panthers on Saturday night.

West Virginia, on the other hand, is not an unbeatable team. Coach Dyke Raese's proteges, who were swamping all opponents in their whirlwind rise to the top, were halted unexpectedly by Temple last Friday night in Philadelphia's Convention Hall. They retaliated Saturday night, however, by decisively whipping W&J to bring the Mountaineer record to 13 victories and 2 defeats.

If Penn State breaks West Virginia's championship bubble by defeating the Mountaineers tomorrow night, it will be sweet revenge for the Lawthermen. Penn State's last loss was an embarrassing 58-33 affair at the hands of West Virginia, and since then the Lions have gone unbeaten.

## Frosh Win In Basketball, Boxing, Lose Wrestling, Swim, And Gym

Two wins and three losses were chalked up by frosh sports teams in five scheduled events Saturday. The boxing and basketball teams marked the credit side of the ledger with wins while the gym, wrestling, and swimming teams were defeated.

In a close decision at West Point, the yearling boxers outpointed the plebes, 4½-3½. Victories in the lower weights tipped the scales in Penn State's favor.

Losing to Mercersburg Academy at Mercersburg, the frosh swim team took only two first places. The score was 42-24. During the meet, J. Ford of Mercersburg, broke the International Interscholastic record in the 440-yard dash with a time of 4:56.

Three straight wins is the record of the '45 basketball squad established when they easily beat the Susquehanna Frosh in Rec Hall by a score of 33-19. Russ

Eckert, giant Nittany center, took top scoring honors with six baskets while Will Parkhill was second high scorer with nine points.

Running into tough opposition with the Navy plebes, the first-year gymnasts were set down to a 31-23 defeat at Annapolis. Julian, Pacific Coast Champion on the side horse, won first in that event and paced what is said to be one of the best Navy freshman teams in years. Ray Sorenson scored one of State's two firsts on the horizontal bars, while Miles Katerman chalked up the other on the rope climb.

After winning the first two bouts in a meet with the Cornell Cubs at Ithaca, the freshman wrestling team lost the contest by a 17-13 score. Drn Valenti, Joe Steele, and Charlie Dipner were the only Penn State men to win their bouts.

## Ohio State Nips Lion Trackmen

Upsets and new records predominated the track and field meet at the Ohio State field house last Saturday night as the Nittany Lions dropped their opening dual meet to the Buckeye cinder squad, 55 2-3 to 48 1-3.

Just as in the past three years, the mile relay event was the deciding element in the battle for track supremacy between the two schools. Ohio State turned in a 3:26 relay time to close the hectic meet.

New records set by Penn State entrants were the 49.5 second quarter-mile effort and the 24 foot, 4 inch broad jump of Barney Ewell and the high jump of 6 feet, 5½ inches turned in by Johnny Glenn.

Curt Stone and Norm Gordon were the other first place winners for the Blue and White with the sophomore two-milers missing the record by .6 of a second with a 9:42.5 performance and Gordon breezing in ahead of Alex Bourgerie with a 4:27.9 mile performance.

Barney dropped the 60-yard dash event to Captain Ralph Hammond to provide the upset of the meet. Best explanation of the Nittany's star's first defeat was given by a Columbia Dispatch reporter, who said, "Hammond, always a slow starter, got off to a brilliant jump and led all the way."

Bob Hazel, Ed Miller, and Don Dolbin just missed placing by taking close fourth position slots.

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
