

College Cabinet Approves Revised Constitution

Open Student Meeting To Discuss Changes Called For Monday

In a three-hour session last night, All-College Cabinet approved the complete revision of the Penn State Student Government constitution and called a special open discussion meeting scheduled in the Alumni Association offices at 8 o'clock Monday night.

President Robert D. Baird called the meeting to give the students a chance to review the new phases of the constitution and reopen discussion for possible revisions. After Monday's meeting, the Cabinet will meet Tuesday night to take final action upon the revised constitution.

The complete revised constitution will be published in The Daily Collegian after Cabinet's final action, and it will be placed for approval or disapproval by the student body during All-College elections, March 24, 25, 26.

After three hours of debate, Cabinet patched up many flaws in the constitution. Some of the important revisions included a definition of student activities, the clearing up of the status of the Interclass Finance Board, the restatement of the composition of the Student Tribunal, the placing of student auditing and finance upon a two consecutive semester rather than an annual basis, and a restriction of the All-College president's veto powers.

Two bylaws on independent men and women representation on All-College Cabinet were presented by Ross B. Lehman '42, chairman of the Cabinet Committee on Bylaws and Amendments. The bylaws were tabled for consideration until next week.

It was suggested that WSGA create the position of independent senator to function on Cabinet. This would coordinate all independent women, Lehman said, and makes the senator responsible for carrying out independent programs for all independent women on campus or in downtown dormitories. Representatives of Philotes, IWA, and other dormitory units would fall under the leadership of this senator, it was added.

Because both IMA and Penn State Club groups claim to represent the independent men and have repeatedly asked for recognition as the official voice of independent (Continued on Page Four)

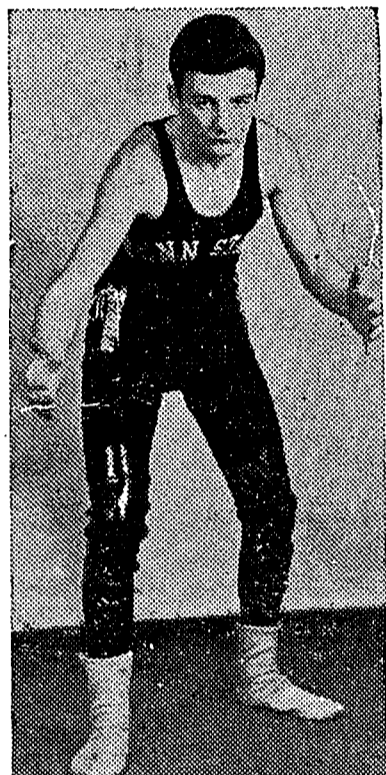
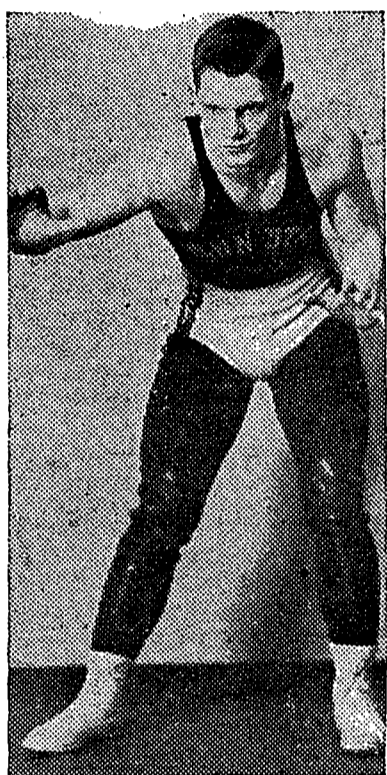

Nine Teams Enter EIWA Classic

Drawings Initiate Morning Schedule

Drawings for the 38th annual Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association tournament will be made at 8:30 a. m. today when nine hopeful college teams are paired off for the first session of the two-day struggle which will be staged in Rec Hall beginning at 2 p. m. today.

Seventy-two eager title-seekers will weigh-in at 9 a. m. following the general managers' meeting at 8:30. Harvard and Yale will be the only two Association members not represented in the tourney. The Eli squad announced its withdrawal from the championship matches yesterday.

In the preliminaries this afternoon "odd" bouts in each of the weight classes will be run off to narrow the field to eight men in the quarter-finals starting at 8 p. m. As a result, only four men will enter the semi-finals tomorrow at 2 p. m. and two would-be champs in each division will vie for individual laurels at 7:30 p. m. tomorrow.

Coach Charlie Speidel will enter a strong Nittany squad which is undefeated this year by an Association member. The University of Michigan grapplers were the only opponents able to measure the Lion team this season.

Charlie Ridenour, defending 121-pound EIWA champion; Sam Harry, 128-pounds; Allan Crabtree, 136-pounds; Captain Glenn Alexander, 145-pounds; John Henry, 155-pounds; Ralph Sayre, 165-pounds; Bob Morgan, 175-pounds; and Mike Kerns, heavy-weight, will be entered for Penn State.

IFC Bridge Tourney Entry Deadline Today

Entries for Interfraternity Council's annual bridge tournament close at 4 p. m. today, Sidney R. Geist '42, chairman, announced yesterday.

Fraternities may enter more than one four-man team, Geist explained, but they must pay the one-dollar fee for each team. Clyde H. Graves, assistant professor of mathematics, will supervise the play, scheduled to begin Monday night.

A trophy will be awarded to the winning fraternity. Beta Sigma Rho took last year's title, while Delta Chi was runner up.

Party Estimates Due Tuesday Noon

The All-College Elections Committee warned all parties last night that campaign plans and estimates of all expenses must be turned in to Student Union by noon Tuesday.

In itemizing expense accounts, it was stressed that specific numbers of campaign materials must be given. Receipts of all purchases will also be required by the committee.

Petitions were approved at the group's meeting yesterday, with a few exceptions. Violations of the elections code were cited, but penalties are being considered.

Platforms were turned in today to the committee and all were approved. They will be released at a later date, however.

Several minor infractions of the no-electioneering clause in the code before the campaigns open have been evidenced, but no action was taken on them yet.

Initial election play-offs in women's organizations were climaxed last night when 13 coeds emerged victors in primary races for WSGA and WRA offices.

Contenders for WSGA vice-presidency in final elections Tuesday will be Dorothy K. Brunner '44 and Dorothy L. Jones '44, while Frances M. Burke '44 and Margaret K. Ramaley '44 will vie for WRA's secondary position.

Competing for other WSGA offices will be Patricia Diener '45 and Joan K. Miller '45, sophomore senator; Gloria Greene '45 and Kathleen M. Osgood '45, WSGA treasurer; and Ruth M. Storer '44 and Helen L. Schmelz '44, junior senator.

With over 47 per cent coed voting, primary winners will enter finals on Tuesday. Ballotting will be held in the first floor lobby of Old Main from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

Final voting for WSGA and WRA presidential nominees, I. Jacqueline Shafer '43 and Margaret K. Sherman '43, and Pauline Crossman '43 and Ann Drivas '43 will be held at this time.

Other candidates to be voted upon then will be WRA treasurer, Frances M. Angle and Grace L. Judge, sophomores; and WSGA Senior Senator, Nancy E. Gosser and Margaret M. Lams, juniors.

Late News Flashes...

MELBOURNE — Allied air force planes were credited last night with destroying 13 Jap transports and one or two warships of the invasion force headed for the New Guinea area.

MOSCOW — The Red Army in the South was said today to have started a march on Hitler and started a strong offensive action in the Ukraine, 90 divisions strong. This action is being led by the USSR's most successful general, Marshal Timoshenko.

RANGOON — Allied forces are preparing to resist the Jap drive for Mandalay and the road to India. Japanese soldiers totalling 56,000 are said to be massed for the attack.
