

Political Platforms

All Campus and Independent clique platforms were approved and released yesterday by Jeanne C. Stiles, chairman of the All-College Elections Committee.

Explanations of the planks in the platforms will be given by each party at an All-College mass meeting scheduled for Schwab Auditorium at 7 p. m. Tuesday.

All platforms as they were released follow. The platform of the Independent '43 and '45 cliques are the same.

CAMPUS '43

We do declare that we will:

1. Advocate and sponsor any and all national defense programs to make our College a leader in our country's war effort.
2. Carry on the business of the College and class in a democratic manner, fostering better relations between fraternity and non-fraternity students.
3. Advocate an intercollegiate sports program during the new semester.
4. Plan an intramural program and make arrangements for normal social activities during the new College term.
5. Advocate increased seating capacity in Rec Hall.
6. Advocate better housing facilities for women in town dormitories, and provide a plan of insurance for personal belongings.
7. Provide a better plan for student parking.

CAMPUS '44

1. Propose to Student Union a coordinated summer co-recreational program of picnics at Whipple's Dam, afternoon dances, and a new system of reservation for use of White Hall sports facilities, tennis courts, and the golf course.
2. Provide a council, members selected from each School Council, to help solve student curricula problems and aid in student-faculty relations.
3. Provide a bulletin board at Student Union for the listing of visiting teams and their State College addresses.
4. Investigate the possibility of fire and theft insurance for town and dormitory coeds.
5. Work for extension of telephone hours in women's dorms, and if possible get more telephones per dorm to help crowded lines.
6. Advocate more interest and greater cooperation in the work of the blood bank committee.

CAMPUS '45

1. To improve the existing relations between fraternity and non-fraternity men and women through hikes, picnics, and evening dances.
2. To cooperate with the Col-

lege in making the defense program here operate with maximum efficiency.

3. To again make the Student Book Exchange a worthwhile proposition.

4. To provide a lasting memorial to the class of '45.

5. To insure the class social functions during the coming year.

6. To increase recreational facilities for non-fraternity men and women by fostering more Open Houses in Old Main.

INDEPENDENT '43 and '45

We, the Independent party, present our nominees for positions in student government. We are sincere in our belief that these candidates are well qualified and willing to serve for the best interests of the general student body.

Youth's Part In War' Pennsylvania Debaters' Convention Topic

"Youth's Part In The War," will be the main topic of discussion at the Pennsylvania State Debaters' Convention to be conducted on the campus next Friday and Saturday.

Twenty-one Pennsylvania colleges and universities will send 125 representatives to the two-day forensic meeting which will include discussions patterned after congressional and state assembly procedures.

Each delegation will bring reports to committees on the three subjects, "What Is Youth's Stake In The War?" "How Can Youth Help In The Prosecution Of The War?" and "How Can Youth Help Meet The Cost Of War?"

Colleges and universities slated to attend the convention include Bucknell, Geneva, Misericordia, Mt. Mercy, Pennsylvania College for Women, Pittsburgh, Scranton, Seton Hill, Albright, Dickinson, Lehigh, Shippensburg State Teachers, Washington and Jefferson.

Temple, Slippery Rock State Teachers, Gettysburg, Lock Haven State Teachers, Westminster, Susquehanna, Cedar Crest, and Penn State.

Open Constitution Meeting Monday

A special All-College Constitution discussion meeting open to the entire student body has been called by Robert D. Baird, All-College president, at the Alumni Association offices, 8 p. m. Monday. Purpose of the meeting is to give all students an opportunity to review and offer suggestions on new phases of the revised constitution approved by Cabinet Thursday night.

After the student body has this chance Monday night to express its views, Cabinet will again go over the constitution, keeping student proposals in mind, and put it to a final vote.

This finally approved constitution will then be published in The Daily Collegian and the student body will either accept or reject it at All-College elections, March 24, 25, and 26.

Baird has stressed the importance of students coming to this meeting and expressing their views since "it will be the only chance they will have for such a discussion of their constitution and it will be Cabinet's only opportunity to feel out student opinion."
