

Voting Begins Tuesday; **Ballot On Constitution**

Political campfires started roaring as weekend campaigning hit the ceiling and Campus and Independent cliques counted only three more days of active "soapboxing" before elections next Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday.

Voting will take place in the first floor lounge, Old Main, on Tuesday and Wednesday, 12:30 to 8 p. m., and on Thursday from 9:30 a. m. to 8:30 p. m. Voting machines will be used to speed up the balloting.

Contrary to former years, the A.A. books will not be needed to vote. This new rule was initiated to create a larger voting group. Instead of punching the A.A. books, the elections committee will hand slips of paper bearing class numerals to voters and the slips will be collected at the voting machines.

Other questions which will be brought before the All-College voters will be the revised All-College Constitution and voting upon the independent men and women representatives on All-College Cabinet.

The independent men candidates will be Richard S. Kurtz '43 and John C. York '43. The independent women on the slate have been announced on page four.

The revised constitution, submitted by Ross B. Lehman '42, chairman of the Committee on By-laws and Améndments, had its third reading and was passed by the All-College Cabinet last Wednesday at a special meeting.

Approximately 15 changes were made in the constitution, but most of them were old amendments and by-laws which had not been included in the present printed constitution. A few other measures were passed to help facilitate the present College war emergency program.

In the race for All-College President, Jerome H. Blakeslee, Campus, and William C. Mazzocco, Independent, will compete down the home stretch. Their, running mates are Glenn W. Ely, Independent, and Jess V. Fardella, Campus.
