

Women Prove Money Makers

Penn State coeds are smart operators, and there's more than \$75,000 to prove it!

Miss Betty Bell, former assistant to the dean of women, compiled a survey which showed that coeds were real money-makers last summer and that en masse they raked in \$75,742.

The average coed pulled in \$110 profit from waiting tables, general sales work, counseling, and punching a typewriter for three months. Only 13 per cent of the potential career women had positions lucrative enough to make over \$200.

Of the 96 per cent of women reporting, 52 per cent worked for pay, while 15 per cent stayed to catch up on extra credits at summer school. A high number saw the world and spent the day swimming, and the nights dancing.

Just to show that a college education does not cramp a housewife's style, 71 per cent, or 949 women, helped out with housework at home during the summer.

Miss Bell's report shows that coeds began premature volunteering for defense work with 6 per cent pitching in to help Uncle Sam. Another 24 per cent assisted in church and club functioning.

Counseling and waitressing recruited 226 women into their ranks, as high-pressure sales women and stenographers fell behind with 207.
