Panhel Committee Suggests First Semester Rush Code

Plan Requires Senate Approval

Designed to simplify rushing over three semesters, a code which suggests that coeds be pledged within a month of matriculation has been given to the Senate Committee on Student Welfare for consideration by Pan-Dellenic Council's committee.

According to Frances E. Haley '43, president, the Council reguests that the Senate Committee sanction the plan for two semester trial periods, beginning in June and September.

Before Panhellenic could consider the code, it would be necessary for the Student Welfare Committee to waive a regulation, effective since February, 1934, requiring a semester's residence before pledging.

Under the proposed code, sorority women would be permitted limited contact with freshman and transfer women during their first week in College. Room visiting and "Dutch treats" would be included.

The rushing committee suggestcd that the following two weeks be made a silent period, in which there would be weekly get-togethers by invitation. Parties would be similar to first semester gettogethers this year.

Formal rushing, immediately following silent period, would be stashed to one week. Formal coffee hours would replace formal

Miss Haley stressed that the code is intended as a temporary Irial measure, formulated to save time and money and to avoid confusion. If it is approved by the Senate Committee, it will go to Panhellenic-Council, where a majority vote will be required to make it effective.

Panhel's rushing committee, which formulated the code, includes Pauline E. Keller '44, chairman, Jean A. Krauser '42. Miss Maley, and Polly I. Phillips '43.

The circulars further stated that only 50 per cent of the colleges invited to attend last year were Drivas pointed out.
