all the Lion victors in his bout with 145-pound Earl Thompson of Illinois.

Harry, who also gained a bye this afternoon, used all his science and coolness to stay on top of the Big Seven titleholder, after an early takedown. The Nittany matmen won by the decisive score of 7-4.

In a hair-raising thriller, Captain Glen Alexander had a difficult task in outpointing his Illinois foe. The Lion grappler earned an early lead of 3-0 but did not sew up the match until 30 seconds from the end of the bout.

Previous to the quarter-final competition Alexander was forced to defeat Warren Johnson, powerful grunt-an-groan artists from the University of Denver.

Allan Crabtree, only Nittany entrant without an EIWA title, won from Dick Sachsel of Rutgers but fell before the probable champion of the 136-pound division. Bill Maxwell, Michigan State's runner-up in 1941, defeated the plucky Nittany grappler by the overwhelming score of 6-0 although Crabtree put up a valiant fight.

Tomorrow afternoon Ridenour will match his strength, experience, and knowledge with Malcolm MacDonald, Purdue's Western Conference champion. Sam Harry take on Sidney Marks of Oklahoma A. and M. while Alexander will tangle with Manley Johnson, another Western Conference titleholder from Michigan.

Arriving by plane late last night, Navy's entrants gave the EIWA a

complete representation of eight titleholders in the tourney. The Easterners still boast at least one semi-finalist in each weight except 136. Princeton's Warren Taylor, only Eastern champ to lose, yielded to Fred Bishop of Cornell College in overtime periods.

The Midshipmen made a clean sweep with Bennett, Carmichael, and Swift all entering the semi-finals tomorrow. Powerful Dick Di Battista of Penn seems assured of repeating his national title at 175.

Sending six men into the semi-finals, the Oklahoma A. and M. cowboys are strongly favored to take their sixth national team championship. Other contenders are Michigan State and Michigan with four apiece. Next in line with three each are Penn State and Navy.

Boxing mentor Leo Houck predicted, after the Wisconsin match, that Baird could handle the Badger stand-out if they tangled again this season. Baird's title bid tomorrow night will mark the second time in the fistic-politico's career that he has advanced to the final round in the national tourney.

Tobiasson of the California Aggies whipped Baird in the 1941 meet held at State College last year after the Nittany valley champ had licked some of the most outstanding entries in the meet.

Baird's victory over Captain Schoff was the second in the six times the old rivals had met. Schoff handed him four straight decisions until the Lion contender broke the jinx in this season's EIBA contest by dishing out a decisive win.

The 145-pound semi-final scrap proved to be one of the outstanding battles of the Nationals with both men wanting to taste victory in their last collegiate encounters. Both fighters, captains of losing teams this season, showed plenty of brilliant boxing and game sportsmanship in staging the feature bout.

Ewell Named All-American

Another honor awarded Penn State and Barney Ewell in their most successful track season was the selection of the Nittany sprint veteran to the All-American track team of the AAU. Ewell holds the AAU title of national champion in the 100 meters event.

He won the title last summer in Philadelphia at the national senior championships over Hal Davis, Salinas sprint star, Paxton Jordan, Texas veteran, and Herb Douglas, newcomer in the sprint world from Xavier College.

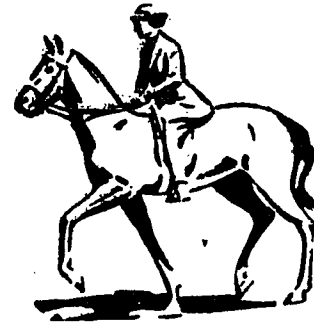
