

Coeds To Try Wiles On Pigs

Coeds may be persuasive with men, but their feminine wiles don't work on pigs, especially temperamental, pedigreed porkers. And they can't lead them around, either.

Five years ago Mark A. McCarty, associate professor of animal husbandry, instigated the first coed pig race held on a college campus at the annual Little International Livestock Exposition at Penn State. Since he says, "It's good for a laugh any time," the race will be a show feature in the Stock Judging Pavilion, Saturday, April 18.

Pigs are being born now that will lead coed handlers to race prizes offered by the Block and Bridle Club. Eight porkers will be castrated in three parts and those placing first and second in the first two rounds will vie for top honors.

Harnessed and leashed, the pigs will be carried to the starting line by men, dropped at the final gun, and spurred on by whips handled by the women. They will run or stagger the length of pavilion, circle the barrel placed there, and squeal their way back to the starting line, a total of 50 or 60 yards. It's illegal for a coed to arrive at the finish before her charge. It's the pigs that win.
