

'Big Sisters' To Aid Frosh

Next semester's Big-Little Sister program, a major part of freshmen orientation, is being organized by WSGA Freshman Council under the chairmanship of H. Anne Caruthers '44, town senator, it was explained at WSGA Senate meeting last night.

The Council is planning to distribute forms on which present freshmen are to signify willingness to be big sister. Present sophomore and junior women who wish to have little sisters for next semester should sign up at the dean of women's office by Wednesday.

WSGA's gift to all coeds will be presented in Rec Hall from 9 p. m. to midnight Saturday in the form of a free formal dance.

Patricia E. Deiner '45, sophomore senator, announced that plans for coeds to date visiting engineers must be cancelled, as dates for the engineering trip have been changed.

Since events for the next two semesters will follow in the same order as in previous years, Senate named a tentative Summer Festival to replace May Day.
