(Continued on Page Four) of 1940, presentees of the gift. Instructions for preparing the plot, unloading the stone block on its arrival, and placing it on the site which will become the artist's outdoor studio have been given to Professor Helme, who has started work on his part of the plan.

Near perfect timing is necessary to cut the cost to a minimum because of high wage rates of the quarrymen who will block out the stone. As soon as the material for the shrine arrives, the full-size model, now on display in the mezzanine lobby of Old Main, will be moved to the spot and everything made ready for beginning work immediately.

The department of grounds and buildings will have charge of preparing the plot of ground. Action will be started on this first phase of the work as soon as the snow has all gone from the ground.

We, The Women Same Song—Second Edit

After reading our editorial yesterday morning, we got a couple more ideas on the same subject. In case you didn't read it (or if your paper didn't come today), we were talking about the need for coeds to "slow down."

We are frankly concerned about the struggle of present coeds to maintain the hierarchy of activities built by pre-war coeds. We feel that each campus organization owes it to its members to ignore precedent and attempt to eliminate a few business meetings, coffee hours, and teas.

To insure that we won't be misunderstood, we had better say that we are not advocating elimination of all activities. It isn't that we don't like teas and coffee hours. It isn't that we fail to see the value in fireside chats. Furthermore, we will admit that groups need business meetings.

But we think this war is a pretty big project and that coeds, as well as draftees, owe it to Uncle Sam (and to themselves) to make a few sacrifices. Time, money, and energy are resources to be hoarded as carefully as rubber and tin.

It occurred to us that sororities might arrange to meet every other week instead of weekly. We think that most coeds would welcome an opportunity to skip a coffee hour and stay home to study and go to bed.

We question the advisability of organizations holding special initiations for convenience of a few members. We wonder how many honoraries could justify all their business meetings.

Coeds' defense activities, although noteworthy, could be expanded and intensified. To suggest additional ways of "doing our part" would be foolish at this point, because everybody already has too much to do.

If coeds had more time and energy, they could do more defense work. And if they still had time to spare, they could get a little sleep.
