

Lion Baseballers, Netmen Win Opening Contests

Tuleya Hurls 3-Hit Game In 10-4 Victory

Laying down a five-run barrage in the first inning, Penn State's baseballers successfully started their Spring campaign as they wallowed Dickinson's Red Devils, 10-4, on the New Beaver field diamond yesterday afternoon.

Ed Tuleya, only experienced hurler for the Lions, held the Dickinson nine hitless and scoreless for four innings, then allowed three safeties in the fifth frame when the visitors' scoring got underway. The fifth-inning singles were the only hits recorded against the tall southpaw pitcher.

Every starting player tallied at least one run for the Blue and White, and Sophomore Bob Vail made two trips across the plate. Whitey Thomas, letterman short-stop, was the only Penn State man to collect two hits, one of which was a double.

Dickinson was weak in several positions, especially the catcher's post, as five passed balls were partly responsible for four Lion runs. Five Red Devils' errors also helped the Bedenkmen, as well as two wild pitches and a balk.

Tuleya struck out four batters, giving up six free passes to first base. Dour Rehor went the distance for Dickinson walking five batsmen, fanning one, as he kept the Lions out of the score column after the first three stanzas. The game went six innings.

Last two opponents tallies were registered by players who got to first by the base-on-balls route, then scored on Tuleya's only wild pitch. However, Penn State scored no runs without the aid of at least one flaw by the visiting nine.

Tomorrow afternoon, the Gettysburg Bullets travel here for another 4 o'clock game, while Saturday at 2:30 p. m. the Lions play hosts to Colgate.

Team morale was boosted at Spring football practice with the announcement by Bob Higgins, head coach, that the Blue and White gridders would travel to Annapolis this Saturday to meet the Navy grid machine in a practice scrimmage.

Yesterday's workout featured passing practice which enabled Dave Alston and Bob Weitzell to shine and a "goal line stand" scrimmage which was featured by the vicious tackling of Ray Uliniski, Bucky Walters and Bill Munwhiler of the Blue squad and the capable blocking of John Jaffurs and Leo Nobile, Orangemen.

The Blue line was dented by Banbury and St. Clair, while the opponents were caught off-guard several times by the excellent pass deception practiced by Alston.

Loss of Bud Davis, second string tailback, will hinder the Lion outfit in its battle with the Wenchell-coached Midshipmen. A twisted knee, an old-high school injury re-hurt by the 155-pound "scooter back," will keep the Nittany athlete from the gridiron for the rest of the Spring season, said Dr. Griess, team physician. Ace Parker, number two man for State, completely baffled Susquehanna's Jack Walsh with his fast breaking service, downing the latter in straight sets, 6-0, 6-0.
