The presidents of both Acacia and AGR as well as representatives of the other houses called stated that as yet they had made no reports of the robberies to borough officials.

IWA To Amend Constitution Pending SW Board Approval

Taylor '42 Given Ex-officio Seat

To tie together loose ends of their administration, IWA Council voted unanimously at last night's meeting to present the first amendment to its constitution, reading, "The representative of independent women on All-College Cabinet shall be an ex-officio member of IWA Council," to Student Welfare Board for approval.

The amendment was added so that the delegate representing independent women, now Muriel S. Taylor '43, would have more direct contact with their problems when she voices them at WSGA Senate, House of Representatives, and All-College Cabinet meetings. Thus, IWA will act as a medium between independent women students and their representative.

Cooperating with Penn State Club, the Council will direct women's part in the newly organized dating bureau. Two sets of cards will be issued for personal information and kept on file for use by men's and women's committees separately.

Coeds fond of dancing and learning new steps are invited by Penn State Club to attend short get-togethers during the week. Penn State Club is also extending an invitation to all women for a hay ride picnic Sunday, April 26. Coeds may contact dormitory representatives for further information.
