

Hikes, Swims, Dances On Program

C and F Fraternity Elects New Officers

William A. Thompson '43 was elected headmaster of Delta Sigma Pi, professional Commerce and Finance fraternity, at a recent meeting.

Elected scribe was Robert E. Pennell '43; Douglas W. Purdy '44, treasurer; Howard J. Snowdon '44, master of festivities; William C. Smith '43, senior warden; Robert W. Lisle '43, junior warden; and George S. Roy '43, historian.

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"Special emphasis will be placed this Summer on recreational activities," according to Ray M. Conger, faculty head of Recreation Co-ordinated.

With definite plans made for hikes to Mt. Nittany, Scotia, Shingletown Gap, the Benner House at Houserville, and Little Flat Tower, the recreation committee promised transportation by bus and truck to the most distant points on the hiker's schedule.

Other plans call for a regular bus and truck schedule to provide transportation for students to such swimming spots at Whipple's Dam and Greenwood Furnace.

Experimentation will be carried out in the early Summer on some of the parking lots to determine the possibility of having outdoor dances on the asphalt courts, explained Conger.

Another well-organized group figured to play an important part in the Summer semester's activity program is the Riding Club. At the present time there are 30 members of the equestrian society who have three riding horses in their 12-mount paddock, and it is hoped that the favorable weather element will aid the outfit in attracting new members.

Other important amusements to be provided are informal tennis and golf tournaments, all separate from the intramural program planned by Eugen C. Bischoff. Reservations will be required for the use of the tennis courts since that plan has proved most successful during past Summers.

A student committee appointed to work with Conger and Bischoff in the program are Bernard A. Plesser '43, Athletic Association president; Ann Drivas '43, Women's Recreation Association; and James E. McKechnie '45.

Any student plan will be accepted by the Recreation Co-ordinated committee, said Conger, and will be considered for use during the Summer months. Plans on regular dances have not been released by the Associated Activities office.

Bischoff Plans Extensive Summer Intramural Program; Mushball, Tennis, Golf Play Slated

Summer at State College won't be dull if Eugen C. Bischoff, associate professor of physical education and director of intramural athletics, has his way.

At the present time Prof. Bischoff is planning an extensive program for intramural competition throughout May, June, July and August. This is all in addition to the regular tournaments scheduled for this semester which will be run off before May 9.

Musiball, tennis and golf tournaments are a sure thing for the Summer with possibilities for swimming, badminton and volleyball competition should sufficient interest be shown.

Leagues will be organized for mushball play. It is planned to form as many eight-team groups, both fraternity and independent, as entries warrant.

Both tennis and golf elimination tournaments will be conducted. Prof. Bischoff is planning four-man team competition as well as medal play in the golf tournaments.

At present possibilities for interschool competition between intramural teams are not the best.

Transportation difficulties afford the biggest obstacle to this plan and also too much time cannot be spent away from classes on trips under the accelerated study plan, Bischoff explained.

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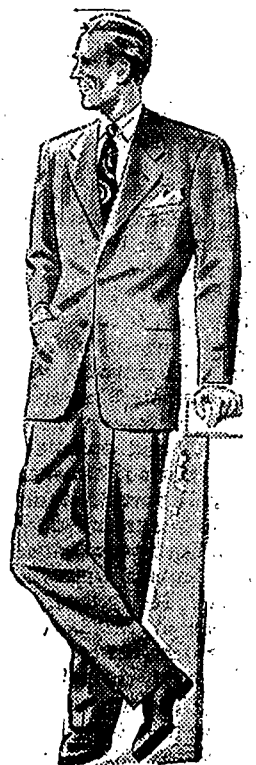
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
