

Brill Explains Senior Sponsors To Guide Frosh Women's Job

"The war will be won when women pitch in."

This is the slogan brought back by Miss Julia G. Brill, associate professor of English composition, from a conference on "War Demands for Trained Personnel," sponsored by the Women's Institute of Professional Relations in Washington, D. C.

Nationally famous speakers from fields vital to the nation's victory presented statistics which revealed the important part women will be taking in every form of industry, said Miss Brill.

College women, high school girls and housewives will have to work side by side, Miss Brill stressed. Women must be willing to do "hum-drum" jobs on farms, in factories, and in all other occupations. College graduates have more opportunity to rise to executive positions, she pointed out.

Largest demand for trained women is in government service. Estimate of Civil Service placements during fiscal year, July 1, 1941 to July 1, 1942, is 830,000 women. Placements made since July are 809,000. Estimate of Civil Service placements which will be made in the next four months is 500,000.

Pamphlets Describe Buck Private's Life

Dedicated to mothers, wives, sisters, and sweethearts of American soldiers, one portion of the Civilian defense exhibit at the corner of South Allen and Beaver streets, covers all phases of a rookie's life. Material on an army man's food, housekeeping, uniform, recreation, religion, and health is available.

Prepared from the standpoint of civilian defense, the display of pamphlets, papers, pictures, and maps is designed to suggest home defense work. The project is arranged by the State College Community Council, assisted by head librarians of the College and State College libraries.

Official facts on war preparations by the national government, books on "How to Win," and details on qualifications for and opportunities in the army, are displayed. Discussions of blackouts, bond-buying, and defense posters are offered as explanatory information.

Detailed nutrition suggestions have been prepared for home economics majors, while articles on cancer and the "War Against Waste" are prepared for those interested in medicine and physical education.

"How to Live During a War," "Community Planning for the Future," "Defense Work in Schools and Libraries," and a consumer's guide are on hand for interested persons.

496 Coeds Select Rooms
