

Injuries Hamper Track Chances

Twenty Lion trackmen departed last night for East Lansing, Mich., where they will meet the Michigan State thinclads tomorrow afternoon.

The team will be under a handicap for this meet as great as any it has suffered this year. Five of the top-flight track and field men will be missing from the Nittany ranks when they meet the Wolverines, considered a very strong team.

Johnny Glenn and Max Peters, still out with ankle injuries, did not make the trip. Marty Schiff, of the sprint department, has been in bed with a severe cold all week. Len Frescoln, big discus thrower, has had to remain here to take final exams today, and Alex Bourgerie, distance man, could not make the trip.

The point-getting ability of these men will be missed in the final score tally, Coach Chick Werner said yesterday. Replacements made in the lineup before departure last night were Chuck Phillips to take Schiff's place and Louis Borges, replacing Bourgerie. The home track feature for the weekend will be the freshman meet with Cornell frosh at New Beaver Field, 1:30 p. m. Saturday. Starring in this meet will probably be Bill Shuman and Gerry Karver in the 440 and distances respectively.

Following this meet which opens the dual season, both frosh and varsity will tangle with Temple on New Beaver Field, Wednesday, and the varsity will meet Pittsburgh, away, next Saturday, and Syracuse at home, May 16.

Frosh Baseball Team Opens Against Cornell

With plenty of material from which to draw, freshman baseball coach, Leo Houck, will send his yearling squad into its first game of the year against Cornell freshmen on the New Beaver Field diamond at 12:30 p. m. tomorrow.

According to Houck, the starting lineup consists of Jack Weber, frosh basketball star at first base, Bud Bauer at second, Don Sandercock at shortstop, Paul Zender at third, John Bennett in left field, Howard Grebs in right field, and Bill Grimes in centerfield. Behind the plate will be Charley Petron, catching for any one of six pitchers, including Bob Bolger, Arland Wagonhurst, Joe Golembeski, Ken Yount, Bob Gehrett, and Jim McCaughan.

Undefeated Golf Team Meets Cornell And Pitt At Ithaca This Weekend

Leaving for Ithaca yesterday, the undefeated Lion golfers headed for their first EIGA meets of the season with Pitt and Cornell. Penn State will play Cornell today and Pitt tomorrow afternoon.

The team that will play in the rounds today against Cornell is made up of the same players who so easily put West Virginia and Bucknell out of the way over the last two weekends.

Making the trip are Captain Chuck Seebold, Bob Wallace, Dick Stephens, Dent Holden, Bill Swan, and Jim Kramer. Ed Fairchild went along as utility man in case any of the players were hurt.

Cornell last downed Penn State in 1937, while Pitt has taken the Lions four out of the last five times the teams have played. Last year's scores were Penn State 8, Cornell 1, and Penn State 5, Pitt 4.

Coach Rutherford said his boys will have a better chance this year since they are not playing both matches on the same day as they have in previous years.

Lion Nine Tries To Stop Three-Game Losing Streak

West Virginia Plays Two Contests Here

Suffering from three straight losses on opponents' diamonds, Penn State's baseball squad is back on New Beaver Field to battle the Mountaineers from West Virginia at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

"Because our pitching staff is so weak keeping the fielders busy every game, we've been concentrating on defense," said Coach Joe Bedenk at yesterday's drills. "Tuleya is the only good full-distance pitcher on the team," the former All-American football player explained, "and when he's off form, we're practically sunk. Warren Pyer is a fine relief hurler, but he's in good shape for only a few innings at a time."

Because of his slight build, "Fireman" Pyer does not have as much speed as a heavier pitcher, and has to rely on his good curve balls. While this hurling is effective, it fires a pitcher more than any other type of pitching.

Among the changes in the lineup are two shifts in the outfield. Fran Farris, a senior, will patrol left field while Ed Sebastianelli learns the ropes at Farris' regular post, second base. George McWilliams, catcher, is too valuable to warm the bench, so he may be expected to start in the outfield, along with Bob Perugini and Farris. Sophomore Bill Sider has moved in at third, replacing Sparky Brown, whose hitting is below par. Other infield positions include Captain Bill Debler on first base, Sebastianelli at second, and Whitey Thomas as short stop.

The mound job is a question, with Eddie Tuleya, southpaw, as the most likely answer. Oggie Martella will be behind the plate.
