

I. Call at Registrar's Office for your Grade Report. No undergraduate students in attendance the first semester will be permitted to register without his grade report which will be retained by the adviser.

2. Report at the office of your scheduling officer, as indicated below, and secure your approved and signed schedule. New students must present official credentials from the Registrar or College Examiner, Old Main Building, in order to secure a schedule.

Students who wish to change their course should do so before their schedule is made. 
