

Freshmen Apply For Admission At 100-A-Week Rate

Applications for admission to the College have been coming in at the rate of better than 100 a week, but at least half of them are for the semester beginning in September, according to William S. Hoffman, registrar.

The totals to date show that 448 admissions have been accepted and paid for the Summer semester, while an additional 175 have been accepted. This brings the number to 623 students who will enter the College next week when the freshmen register.

The combined totals for admission to the two semesters at present exceed those of a year ago for the class of '45. The new accelerated program, however, will split the group into two sections. It is probable that for the duration, there will be no more classes of the large size of those admitted before the war.

Enrollment in the School of Engineering leads all the other Schools with the School of Chemistry and Physics a close second. This is the second time in recent years that the technical courses have attracted a larger number of

The School of Physical Education has the smallest number of new applicants, while the Schools of Education, Agriculture, and Mineral Industries rank in that order.

Of the complete number of admissions, approximately one-sixth of them are from out of the state. About 48.8 per cent graduated from high school in the first fifth of their class, while 30.5 per cent were in the second fifth.

ROTC Staff Names 85 For Advanced Course

Selected Men Enlist For Three-Year Period

Eighty-five juniors have been selected for the advanced ROTC infantry course from approximately 200 applicants, according to an announcement made yesterday by Col. Edward D. Ardery, head of the department of military science and tactics.

Under the United States War Department officer-training program, the men chosen were required to volunteer for a three-year enlistment in the Reserve Army. Because of this enlistment the prospective officers will not be required to register for selective service. They will receive a basic pay of 25 cents per day until graduation when they are called to active duty.
