

'Bible,' Collegian, School Magazines Will Help In Freshman Orientation

Arriving on campus just a day or two before the start of classes and the beginning of regular campus life, this year's group of incoming freshmen would find orientating themselves to campus life a very difficult problem without the aid of several informative pamphlets published by various organizations.

So important that new students will be required to carry it at all times is the Freshman Handbook published by the Penn State Christian Association. Known as the "Frosh Bible," this book contains pertinent information concerning the College itself, student government, organizations, freshman customs, activities, athletics, and general campus information.

College songs and cheers, which all freshmen will be required to know, are listed in the Handbook. A detailed map of all important buildings on campus and in town is also included.

An accurate day by day account of Penn State doings can be found in the columns of The Daily Collegian, now in its third year of daily publication. Other informative publications are the

Penn State Engineer and the Penn State Farmer, applying chiefly to the Engineering and Agriculture students, respectively.

Campus bulletin boards and downtown store windows are both traditional sources of information. Announcements concerning calls for athletic teams and managers, coming athletic events, and publicity announcing campus dances and parties are found on these. Penn State Players, Thespians, Glee Club, Band, Orchestra, Debating, Agriculture Groups and Campus Clubs, societies and fraternities also use this method of making announcements.
