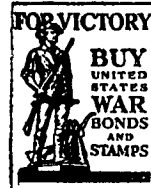

Airforce Reserve Enlists 13 More; Total Reaches 90

The Aviation Cadet Examining Board added 13 students to the number of Penn State men enlisted in the Air Force Enlisted Reserve yesterday, bringing the total for this enlistment period to 26 and the grand total to approximately 90 since the start of the drive, Prof. Robert E. Galbraith, board coordinator, announced.

Students who passed air crew examinations yesterday were Wilbur S. Creelman '45, Julian I. Lewis '43, Donald E. McKee '44, Marshall B. Morgan '44, Weldon W. Ragsdale '44, Robert D. Rath '44, Louis Reynolds '44, Thomas W. Riley '43, and Donald G. Steva '44.

Ground crew enlistees whose applications were passed by the local examining board and submitted to Washington for final consideration are Karl J. Israel '43, Robert A. Kulp '44, Russell E. Schlorff '43, and Arthur G. Wright Jr.

These students will be sworn in and fully enlisted Tuesday.

Ground crew men must have their papers okayed by the local board before they are examined by national boards. The board decides on their acceptance or rejection and place them according to the ground crew branch which they are most fitted to enter. Basis for this latter is College credits and proficiency in certain fields of work.

Frosh Camp Replaces Traditional 1st Week With 3-Day Program

Replacing traditional Freshmen Week which has been dropped because of the accelerated program, the PSCA-sponsored Freshman Camp got under way for its three-day session when 70 frosh arrived at Diamond Valley yesterday morning.

Under the leadership of Gerald B. M. Stein '44 and a staff of 11 counselors, the freshmen will hear 25 campus leaders and faculty members discuss problems of adjustment that may arise in bridging the gap between high school and college.

"Since many of the class of '46 haven't even received their high school diplomas yet, the Camp may serve a valuable purpose in making the frosh feel at home on the campus," Stein said. "It is regrettable that more of the 600 entering yearlings could not take advantage of this opportunity," he added.

Frosh Start Activity Tomorrow; Customs To Begin Wednesday

Name Cards Required Beginning Tuesday

With the usual custom-free Freshman Week abolished under the College's accelerated program, members of the Class of '46 will be required to observe all freshman customs beginning Wednesday at noon, according to an announcement last night by Charles H. Ridenour '43, head of Student Tribunal.

As a get-acquainted measure, name cards will be required beginning Tuesday at 8 a. m., Ridenour stated.

Frosh customs, practically the same as in other years except for the elimination of black bow ties, require all freshman men to wear green dinks, name cards, and white socks. Matches and the freshman "bible" are to be carried at all times.

In addition to dress customs, freshmen are not allowed to smoke on campus except unvarnished corn-cob pipes or they must not walk on campus grass and must enter Sparks Building and Old Main by the front middle door only. No dinks are to be worn in Old Main. A complete list of frosh customs is listed in the Handbook.

Freshman men eligible for custom exemption may present their cases at a hearing before Tribunal next week. The time and place of the meeting will be announced in The Daily Collegian Tuesday.

A rule requiring freshmen to lift their dinks as they pass the old willow tree standing beside the water fountain on the Mall is being considered by the Board. Ridenour, D. Norman Lamond '43, Samuel G. Fredman '43, J. Robert Hicks '44, and Joseph H. H. Ridenour '44, Tribunal members, explained that the purpose of the committee is not to haze freshmen but to serve in a disciplinary capacity and to help freshmen adjust themselves to their new environment.

The Board, while hoping for a minimum of violators, will deal severely with offenders. In past years violators have been made to carry large signs, wear dresses, or even walk on barrel staves, according to their offense.

Penn State ADS Places Among First Three In National Ad Contest

Penn State's chapter of Alpha Delta Sigma, national honorary advertising fraternity, placed among the first three in an advertising campaign contest sponsored by the national ADS.

Competition was based on a campaign to sell defense bonds and stamps, according to Prof. Donald W. Davis, department of journalism, faculty adviser. John J. Long '42 was president of the Penn State group.

First place, won last year by Penn State, was taken by New York University, runners-up to the campus chapter in 1941.

Meetings, Registration, Tests Pack Schedule

First big meetings of all freshmen entering Penn State's precedent-breaking Summer semester will be held in Schwab Auditorium at 7:30 p. m. Monday when more than 600 frosh are expected to be organized for registration and counsel meetings.

Adding an additional 250 students to the enrollment will be registrants for the inter-session, which lasts until June 29. Both groups will register in the first floor lounge of Old Main from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday. Inter-session classes begin Monday afternoon, while freshmen will start at 8 a. m. Tuesday.

Immediately after the Sunday evening mass meeting, the freshmen will report to counsel meetings where upperclassmen will advise their respective sections of the wartime class about campus locations, affairs, and freshman problems.

Monday will be a busy one for the new group, with registration and issuance of ROTC uniforms during the days, according to schedule, and English placement tests at 6:30 p. m. At 8 p. m. the undesignated class will hear President Ralph D. Hetzel at the convocation meeting in Schwab auditorium.

Additional counsel meetings will be held after the mass meeting. Name cards will be worn starting Tuesday morning when classes begin, and other customs will start Wednesday noon. Psychology tests will probably be given in two-hour evening periods later in the week.

Nearly half of the freshman class, 48 per cent, rank in the upper fifth of their high school classes, according to William S. Hoffman, registrar, and only 7 per cent were classified in the lower two-fifths. Many of the class will not have received high school diplomas before entering.

A special 12-page issue of The Daily Collegian, written to aid freshmen, and the Student Handbook, sponsored by the PSCA, were mailed to newcomers accepted by the registrar before last Tuesday. Copies of the pamphlet "Penn State Fraternities" were also distributed.
