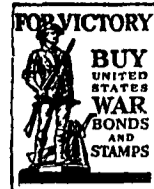

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## Pathway Cleared For Mammoth 'Victory Weekend'

United action by leading campus groups is fast clearing the way for the highlight of Penn State's Summer semester activities, a gigantic "Victory Weekend."

The festival, to be staged between July 31 and August 2, is being planned to offer an interlude of relaxation in the speeded-up wartime program.

The search for a suitable date was eliminated last night when the Penn State Forestry Society offered to give up their annual "Bunyon Ball," scheduled for August 1.

Their date will be used for a special all-State College dance featuring music by the biggest name band available.

Theatricals, Penn State Players, and the College Glee Club have assured All-College Cabinet of their willingness to pool their top talent for a "show of shows," to be presented twice during the weekend.

The College's grounds and buildings department, meanwhile, flashed the green light to a request to use a large part of the campus for a mammoth lawn carnival.

Continued progress of Victory Weekend plans was assured last night when Jerome H. Blakeslee '43, all-College president, appointed an executive committee to coordinate future preparations.

General chairman of the all-State College festival is Leon Rabinowitz '43, originator of the "Victory Weekend" idea.

Other newly-appointed committee members are: David J. McAleer '43, recreation; Arthur R. Warnock, dean of men, representing townspeople and faculty members; Bernard A. Plesser '43 and Bernard M. Weinberg '43, program; and Donald W. Davis '43, publicity. Woodrow E. Hoch '43, Robert L. Mawhinney '43, Margaret K. Sherman '43, and Howard E. Wheeler '43, also serving on the executive committee will study recommendations for disposition of the weekend's proceeds.

Five of the sophomore class's "most beautiful" coeds will reign at the Soph Hop, July 10, so far the Summer Semester's only scheduled "big" dance, according to an announcement by Walter C. Price, chairman of the dance committee, last night.

Betty J. Lyman will be crowned "Soph Hop Queen," and will lead a grand march scheduled to feature the dance. Under her will be a court of four including Kathleen M. Osgood, Mary Edith Gilbert, Gunnell O. Bjalme, and Kathryn K. Metzger.

Selected by a group appointed from the Hop committee the girls were chosen on the basis of "beauty and personality," according to Price.

The field for a band to play the dance has now been narrowed down to three "name" orchestras. Originally the committee considered ten bands but now they are busy trying to sign one of three. Price also stated that an announcement concerning the band will be made in the "very near future."

Also busy planning the dance are the refreshment and decorations committee. Both of these groups are formulating plans to keep the summer night dancers comfortable. The financial allotment for punch has been doubled and the decorations will be constructed with the idea of keeping Rec Hall "cool and comfortable," said Price.

### Hammond Names Honor Engineers; 86 Attain 2.5

Eighty-six freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors in the School of Engineering attained a 2.5 average or above during the second semester of 1941-42, automatically placing them on the Dean's list, according to figures released yesterday by Dean Hammond's office.

The seniors led the School numerically with 44 named to the list, followed by the juniors with 16, the sophomores with 14 and the freshmen with 12. Ranking by courses show the electrical engineers ahead with 39 of them being named by Dean Hammond. All-College Cabinet rejected the Penn State Christian Association's proposal for keeping actual bookkeeping of the PSCA within their own organization, subject to the auditing and rechecking of the Associated Student Activities System. The PSCA was given until July 1 to comply with the provision in the All-College Constitution that requires all campus organizations, to which students contribute in part or wholly towards its upkeep, to have their bookkeeping done by a central accounting department.

Should the PSCA fail to turn books over to the ASAS they will automatically lose their seat on All-College Cabinet.

**FRESHMAN CUSTOMS**  
1. Freshmen shall carry at all times matches and a copy of the Student Handbook, known as the "Freshman Bible." Information on the identification page must be filled out in full. The matriculation card must also be carried at all times with the information filled out completely. Freshmen must also wear a regulation sign four inches by ten inches upon which his name and home town are printed in one-inch, black, inked letters. (Continued on Page Two)
