

College Will Train Coeds For Drafting

Believing that coeds want to make a contribution to victory, the College will offer two defense courses to both men and women not enrolled in the School of Engineering, according to Prof. K. B. Johnstone, general course director, and architecture department head.

Classes in airplane drafting, for which the only requirement is that students enrolling, plan to graduate upon completion of the course, will be given primarily for women. Drafting and blue print reading, components of the course, will be offered with no college credit and therefore may not be substituted for regular work.

For admission to the ship layout and drafting classes, students are required to have completed an engineering drawing course and one in mathematics through trigonometry. The course is designed to prepare men and women for positions in ship building firms and naval drafting departments.

No tuition or fees will be charged and students will be furnished with necessary equipment in both courses. With eight hours of drafting room practice each week, courses will begin July 1 and continue for 25 weeks. Classes will meet in late afternoon or early evening hours.

Prof. A. L. Tobias, engineering drawing division, will teach the airplane drafting course; and Prof. R. M. Gerhardt and Prof. H. A. Everett, head of the mechanical engineering department, and former faculty member of the Naval Postgraduate School, Annapolis, will direct the second.

Applications for class membership may be filed at Student Union or in 301 Main Engineering where further information may be obtained from Mr. Johnson.

The special drive for women workers, being made through the Federal government, is a result of the scarcity of men who are being called to the armed forces.

Given as a part of the Engineering, Science, and Management Defense Training Program of the U. S. Office of Education, Mr. Johnstone stated that women needed should come from the ranks of college women who have intelligence, personality, and leadership qualities.

We, The Women Panel Terms Puzzle Frosh And Sorors

Because terms such as "silent period," "restricted" and "free association," "open houses," and "formal rushing" confuse many upperclass women, we understand how they may be completely incomprehensible to freshman and transfer women. In an attempt to clarify these Panhellenic terms, we will explain how they are going to affect freshmen and transfers in relation to sorority women.

"Silent period," now in effect, does not permit sorority women to talk or walk with freshmen or transfers. However, Big Sisters may associate freely with their Little Sisters. This will permit you, as freshmen, to become fully acquainted with the College and all its activities without the complications of sorority rushing. "Silent period" is often referred to as "restricted association."

"Free association" is free and natural contact between sorority, freshman, and transfer women. For one week, beginning at 8 a. m. Wednesday, June 17, sorority, freshman, and transfer women may visit each other in houses, suites, dormitories, and on and off campus from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. only. A strict "silent period" (similar to present association) will be in effect at all other hours.

An "open house," in which sororities open their doors to freshmen and transfers, will be held by each sorority from 4 to 5:30 p. m. Thursday, June 26. No invitations will be issued, but all freshmen and transfers should attend as many "open houses" as possible, to become better acquainted with sorority women in each house.

As decreed by Panhellenic Council, no house may offer favors; breakfast, lunch, dinner, and movie dates are not permitted; and all coke dates will be on a dutch-treat basis.

Although "free association" ends at 6 p. m. Tuesday, June 23, with another strict "silent period" in effect, an "open house" (similar to the first one), is scheduled for Wednesday, July 1.
