### In The Groove

One of the greatest athletes in Penn State annals is nearing the close of his collegiate career. Barney Ewell, a colored boy who had the natural physique and coordination necessary, has done much in addition to help him reach the track pinnacle which he has.

One of the greatest secrets of his success lies in his excellent form has "become a habit" with him, as Coach Chick Werner put it. This form which is natural to him now however only came with constant work. Since he does no longer have to stop and think about his form, he is completely relaxed when he runs; in the groove, so to speak. Those close to the track can very often actually hear him talking or laughing as he runs.

Barney never strains as he runs. Never does he strain forward as he reaches the tape. It is part of his smooth flowing form to merely stride steadily across the finish. Not even in his face is any strain evident. And this can be said of very few runners.

Ewell has scored 37 first places in his three years of varsity competition. In winning three firsts at the outdoor IC4-A's this year, Barney became the only athlete in the 66-year history of the association to score a "triple-triple." He won three titles three years in a row. At the Nationals this weekend he will meet his old rival Hal Davis, a sprinter equally as renowned as Ewell.

Nine outdoor IC4-A titles. Co-holder of 100 yard record; holder of 220 record.

Three indoor IC4-A titles; two seconds; holder of broad jump record.

Four NCAA outdoor titles. Two National AAU outdoor titles; four seconds.

Two National AAU indoor titles, 300 metre and 60.

#### Miscellaneous Titles

Won Penn AC (Philadelphia) indoor 50 yard dash three years. Broke World's Record twice at 5.1 and 5.0.

Won Drake Relay 100 yard title.

Won Penn Relays broad jump title.

Won two Millrose Games titles—300 yd. and 60. Tied World's Record in 60 yard dash at 6.1.

Won Seton Hall Games Sprint title.

Won Boston AC 60 yard dash title.

Set world's record for 200 yard dash at Rochester in 18.9 seconds.

## Yanks Lose 4-1 In 11-Innings

New York's league-leading Yankees were involved in an 11-inning battle with Detroit but came out on the short end of a 4-1 score to lose to the Tigers in yesterday's feature major league game. Harris' three-run homer in the 11th decided the contest. Benton was the winning hurler for the Tigers, while Johnny Murphy made the box score as "losing pitcher." Joe Gordon got a hit in the 11th to extend his hitting streak to 27 games.

Meanwhile, the Boston Red Sox were swamping the St. Louis Browns for the second day in a row, 10-3. Johnny Niggeling, starting Brown hurler, was hammered from the box by the Red Sox hitting splurge, while Hughson stayed the distance for Joe Cronin's outfit.

Dom DiMaggio and Conroy had homers for the Red Sox and Mike Chartak, Brown outfielder recently acquired from Washington, hit his first round tripper for the Missouri club. This was Conroy's second homer in two days.

Jimmy Dykes' Chicago outfit topped the last-place Philadelphia A's, 4-1, to pull a full game ahead of the eighth-place spot. The battle for the "cellar" was highlighted by the pitching duel between Ross of Chicago and Christopher of the A's.

In the National League, the feature game between the Brooklyn "Bums" and the second-place St. Louis Cards was called off while the Chicago Cubs won by a 5-2 margin from the National League's cellar dwellers, the Phils.

Big Bill Lee turned in a masterful pitching performance to make it 16 games for the Passeau-Lee combination, the only hurlers who can seem to win for Jimmy Wilson.
