## Gridders Add Camp Lee To Tough 1942 Schedule

### Lions Also Face Penn, Cornell, Pitt In Fall

Playing against the first service football team since World War I, Penn State's 1942 grid machine will meet the soldier eleven from Camp Lee, Va., in a post-season battle at Richmond, Va., November 28, it was announced yesterday by Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics.

The Nittany gridiron squad this fall faces one of its toughest schedules in recent years, especially with the addition of the University of Pennsylvania and Cornell. The Lions will also have to wade through Colgate, whose over-rated team upset Bob Higgins' boys early in the 1941 season, then meet Bucknell and Lehigh.

The Orangemen from Syracuse, whose highly publicized "Y" formation was smashed by the Blue and White in their last encounter here, occupy the next spot on the card.

West Virginia will return to stack its air attack against the Nittany defense, and Pitt, defeated on the Smoky City field last year for the first time since Coach Higgins was a Penn State All-American, will wind up the regulation season.

Although the Camp Lee match is definite as far as initial arrangements are concerned, it still needs the approval of the Athletic Advisory Board, which will probably sanction the fray at its July 18 session.

Drawing power of the Richmond contest is estimated at 60,000 soldiers from the South Virginia section, as well as civilians in the area. Proceeds will go to the Camp Lee athletic fund with the Penn State team getting expenses.

Two basketball games will also be played with Camp Lee, one on the Rec Hall court January 27, and the other at Camp Lee, February 5. Last winter the Penn State five entered the NCAA tourney at New Orleans, La., after annexing the Eastern district crown.

A game with the Wissahickon Barracks eleven, one of four on the schedule in 1918, was the last grid match versus a service team, although an Army camp fray was also played in 1917.

Lt. Jack Springer, former star of the West Virginia football eleven, is athletic head at Camp Lee and was in charge of booking the Penn State tussle.

## Lacrosse Candidates

Bill Debler, captain of the 1942 squad, may appear in Saturday's lineup since the condition of his foot is greatly improved. The foot infection confined the Blue and White ace to the College infirmary for four days and caused him to miss his first game in two years.
